Kill your weeds naturally with: boiling water or full strength white distilled vinegar or white vinegar, salt, and liquid dish soap No need for $10 \%$ or $20 \%$ vinegar (acetic acid) which is very dangerous to handle
Peeling lots of citrus fruits?
Please bag 5 or more pounds of citrus peelings separately from your garage. Place the tightlytied, plastic bag of peelings on the top of your garbage pail. This is very helpful to our maintenance staff who collect this by hand.
Why should we put our curb-side recycling in a white or light colored 13 gallon plastic bag?
VO's maintenance staff can visually check your tightly-tied, curb side recycling for contaminates like coffee grounds, kleenex, paper plates and napkins in a light colored plastic bag instead of a black bag. These contaminants cause your whole bag of recycling to tossed in the garbage. Picking up one filled, 13 gallon, white plastic bag is a much more efficient use of time and energy by our maintenance staff who pick these bags up by hand.

# (1) Manager's Corner 

February 24, 2017
This week's occupancy is 1556 or $89 \%$ vs. 1559 the last count and 1546 the year prior. There are currently 435 renters in the park.
Welcome to all our Spring Break Visitors, so far 2500 of you have checked in and on average we will host 8000 overnight guests in the next 30 days. So if it seems a little crowded at the pool... it is. Our janitorial crew is having difficulty accessing and getting the pool bathhouses cleaned due to this crush, so if you see the signs outside the door, please give them a few minutes to finish their job.
Remember, no one can drive a golf cart that is not at least 16 years of age or up. Lock up your bikes and make sure you accompany your young guests at all times.
With the passage of the Sport Plex proposition, this office has a big job sorting out all the RV storage requests in both the North and South lots. First, we currently have 42 cars and pickups in storage. We have approximately 240 homeowners/units that are not in residence during the peak of the season. Some of those homeowners already rent out their driveways to their neighbors, but many are vacant. We will first contact all the absentee lot owners and ask them if they are willing to rent their driveways out this next season. We will start a list in our office of those available spaces and make that list available to those who need a second car space. When the new web site is finished, we will have a specific spot on the Bulletin Board just for car space rentals, so they will be easy to find. We are fairly confident that if we make this easy for both parties, then lot owners should be able to find a spot for a second car or pickup close to their home. Finally we will also heavily promote this with the summer newsletter.

This reserves the SE lot primarily for storage of RV's. Spaces that are too small for an RV will be available for cars. After consultation with the Board, it is agreed to have some parameters. First is the term of the lease, the longer the lease, the more likely the space will be yours. Second, is the individual's tenure as a renter in either storage lot. If you are a long term renter, you will be at the top of the list. Third will be having an available space that fits the unit. We have 88 RV spaces in the SE lot and 89 RV's and one boat that have been renting spaces. The sizes of the spaces of course are not uniform and may not fit all the requests we have.
We have also been calling around to other storage facilities and have found availability near VO. We found one storage facility that is $\$ 50 / \mathrm{mo}$. and they have availability now. It would probably be a good idea to put your name in with these other facilities now, to insure a space next season as we sort out the units in the park.
Please come into the ADMIN office and give Lynette and Olivia your space request. They will need at least until the end of May to sort through all the reservations and place people/RVs per the above guidelines. Please also, 'Don't kill the messenger'! We know that many of you are anxious about getting a space and we will do everything we can to help you.
Construction will start shortly after season. The NE lot will need to be vacated as soon as possible. If you have a unit in the NE lot that is to be there past April $1^{\text {st }}$, we will let you know how long you can stay in the space, and when it must be moved, we will find another location until you leave. As most people leave in March, spaces will open up.
Next week we go into budget. For one solid week, the Board meets and starting at ZERO, they build the budget. Anyone who has ever sat through the process has found it to be very enlightening. There is nothing that is considered 'too small' to be deliberated. By contrast all the 'for profit' rental parks around us that are comparable, average between $\$ 7000$ and $\$ 8000$ a year for their lot rentals, which really demonstrates the job that your Board does.

The Veranda, located in the north-east tennis complex, is in use seven days a week for viewing tennis and as a venue for various social functions. It is highly functional, complete with kitchen, bathrooms, and storage. Its conception and construction is a testament to the cooperation of governance and efforts of skilled volunteers.
In 1998, Pete Trepanier, then president of the Tennis Club, envisaged a facility that, while meeting the basic needs of some 300 tennis players, would also provide an outdoor meeting area for all park residents. After Pete spent two years meeting with the Long Range Planning Committee, Social and Condo Boards, and the City of Mesa, approval to proceed was finally achieved. The Social Board contributed $\$ 20,000$, the Condo Board $\$ 6,000$, and the Tennis Club committed to raising an additional $\$ 9,000$ and to provide labor for construction. Since the Tennis Club had no ready money, Pete and wife, Poochie, loaned the club the required $\$ 9,000$ to be repaid interest-free over the next three years by raising the dues of club members.
The Tennis Club was quick to act. Architectural drawings by Howard Soper; site work, permits, and utilities by Pete Trepanier; foundations and block walls by Mike Miller; roof and gables by Doug Ward; electrical by Vern Sauer; interior finishing by Roy Thiessen; and a constant army of volunteers, coordinated by Dan Garinger, assisted in each area to bring the job to rapid completion. Pete said that the only job contracted to a professional was plumbing since no one felt they had either the will or necessary expertise. "These were simpler times then; regulations needed to be followed, but there was a more relaxed attitude." The Veranda is part of the proposed northeast Sports Plex and will see its outdoor area enlarged. The building remains essentially the same; continues to be in good condition; is well used, and while the park lists it as "The Veranda," many of the tennis old-timers will always think of it as "Pete's Place."
By the way, Pete and Poochie were married 62 years ago on Christmas Day!

After the completion of the new Community Center, past presidents Merv Houghton and John Ingebrand began looking into the feasibility of a charitable foundation for Venture Out. They visited Leisure World and were convinced that a good portion of the now-completed Community Center could have been paid for with charitable dollars had we had a foundation in place to accept tax-free donations.
Immediate past President of the Condo Board, Norm Thiessen, was asked to chair a steering committee comprised of Florence Brownridge and John Jones. Norm visited Leisure World's Foundation officials and returned with copies of their governing documents. After many hours of research, Norm drafted the mission statement and governing documents which enabled the committee to establish the goals of stability and development for the future.
Norm also approached the Memorial Society which donated $\$ 1000$ so the committee could enlist a tax lawyer to develop a tax-free charitable foundation and review the documents. The Foundation had to be completely separate from both the Condo and Social Boards. The first significant project was taking over the "Walk of Fame," a successful program. A $\$ 100.00$ donation provided an engraved brick which was placed along a side entrance to the Community Center. The Foundation also held a dedication in 2016 at the entrance to the park honoring military veterans with their names and emblem of service placed on a donated brick.
Bob and Florence Brownridge donated seed money from the sale of their home as well as profits from the auction of their golf cart. The Foundation then offered services to residents such as the "life alert" for senior citizens. ( Contact Colleen Beyer for more information.)
The Foundation has been instrumental in contributing to many projects such as the East Pool Complex with its high capacity fans, pool-lift, non-slip floor in the Cabana, saunas, enhanced door mechanisms, and others, totaling $\$ 80,000$. The Foundation provided funds for an ATM in the post office and our speakers' forum is also a beneficiary. See the Outlines for current topics.
The Foundation plans to introduce a Broadway portal which provides access to a safe place for bike and cart parking near public transportation. In addition, they are examining ways to offer tax-deduction opportunities which could support future endeavors, and create methods for residents to contribute to specific interests.
You can leave a legacy by asking family and friends to provide a memorial to the Foundation in the event of your death, make a contribution to a memorial honoring a loved one, offer a tax-free donation, make the Foundation a beneficiary in a trust or will, and invite others to do the same.
Many of our residents are $2^{\text {nd }}$ and $3^{\text {rd }}$ generations and past residents have paved the way for our enjoyment. The Foundation is one avenue which allows us to be part of a bright future while we enjoy the present.

Upon cursory investigation, it appears that we are responsible for at least some of it. Each week, the average person sloughs at least $1 / 3$ ounce of dead skin! The only other creature I know of that sheds its skin is a snake, and heaven forbid that we shall compare ourselves to that slithery mass of muscle.
Facts excuse us from being major creators of dust bunnies. The arid desert climate creates masses of dust just waiting for a puff of wind to send it flying. The Sahara Desert produces the largest amount of dust in the world. ## An Artist's Creation

Pat Bergland, a professional interior decorator and artist, spends summers at a lake home near Duluth, MN. Pat and her husband, Bill, purchased a home on Navajo two years ago and developed it into a contemporary work of art. Only minimal structural changes have been made to the unit; all improvements consist of furnishings and cosmetic upgrades that only an artist could conceive. Their home was featured in the VO 2017 Tour of Homes.
The kitchen, the first room you encounter on your journey through the property, sports a modern industrial and Bahama cabana look. The lower cabinets, built on three-inch legs, consist of large pullout doors composed of a white synthetic material, giving them the appearance of floating in the air. There are no upper cabinets; instead, large steel grill panels arranged symmetrically on black walls, create open shelving decorated artistically. The wall treatments add to the high-tech look, making them appear multi-dimensional. The remainder of the room consists of large, white sofas with vibrant orange pillows. The window and wall treatments of plantation shutters, mirrors, and works of art remind one of an island cabana. The front patio doors are coated in an opaque film with musical notes and clefs etched into the covering.
The bedroom, a combination of a berth in a ship and a bird's nest, includes a high, queen-sized bed with built-in shelves above, giving the appearance of sailing on the high seas. One entire wall is a mural of a tree and birds. The bathroom doubles as an art gallery, with pieces tastefully arranged in built-in display cabinets.
The most unusual feature of Pat's and Bill's work of art is the outdoor patio, accessed through large glass doors from the Arizona room. Situated along one of the back walls of the park, the unit has an incredibly large yard, accented with a large patio table and chairs, as well as several other colorful umbrellas and seating arrangements. Beautiful mural paintings adorn the entire back wall of the park and rear walls of the unit. Trailing flower arrangements and unique finds from across the valley complete the look. The overall impression when sitting outdoors is that you are either in a French outdoor café, or in the French Quarter in New Orleans. Several of the outdoor art works add a whimsical touch to the overall look of elegance. Consistent with Pat's artistic persona, the decorating in their house changes almost daily, making it a living, emerging creation.


## Correspondence 101

At each weekly meeting our Venture Out Creative Writing Club assigns a member to issue a writing challenge to the rest of the group. The following week, members share their responses to the challenge by reading the prose or poetry that was inspired by it. Last week we were challenged to write a personal letter to someone.
Writing a letter to a family member, or friend, sounds like a simple task. Some Venture Out residents do it on a weekly basis. Not me!
In my experience, writing letters does not conjure up positive images. They usually have been motivated by illness, death or some other sort of tragedy. If my kids received a letter from me, they'd think I had blown their inheritance at a casino and didn't have the nerve to call them about it.
My letter-writing struggles whetted my curiosity on modern communication. Actually they drove me to create a brief survey to determine how most Venture Out residents stay in touch with their folks. The results of this might surprise you.
About $80 \%$ of the participants surveyed use their phones to text rather than write letters. While many prefer writing and receiving letters, their kids and grandkids only respond to texts. The irony here is that $90 \%$ of those surveyed save some of the letters they do receive and $80 \%$ treasure historical letters so much that they consider them to be heirlooms. Interestingly, fewer than $10 \%$ of those surveyed expect that any of the letters they sent to loved ones will be saved, either as personal treasures or for historical purposes.
 My biggest surprise on the survey was that only $20 \%$ shared, either in their letters or texts, tales of the activities that fill their lives at Venture Out. I suspect they don't want to tell them how much fun they're having. They probably think that the consequence would be a house full of visitors.
After tallying the survey, I did finish my letter(s). In spite of the fact that my kids are ages 34, 47 and 51, they would be jealous if I only wrote to one of them. I understand this. After all, these letters might become heirlooms. I also got a thank you call from each of them.

The Glass Art Club was founded in approximately 1975 when Ruth Watson first taught stained glass classes in an area that is now the library. Ruth continued these classes for six years before giving them up. The group continued after Teresa encouraged Fred Laurita to start another class in 1992. He started teaching the class on the second floor of the annex before there was an elevator. The classes grew until Fred had over 100 students.
The initial stained glass group was composed of artists who were also interested in glass jewelry, lapidary, and even wood carving. Each of these specialties left the larger group after their specific interest group began. The group was moved into the renovated maintenance building in the early 2000's where they shared space with the woodcarvers.
Two decades later, stained glass is known as Glass Art, better reflecting the mission of their group. It has grown significantly to approximately 200 members with 30 to 35 people creating works of art on a daily basis. The new building, built in 2014, is located on the southeast corner of the campus near the RV Storage. It consists of a single large studio with many work stations, large storage areas and lockers for club members. The room can be divided with a portable wall so classes can be conducted while artists continue with their work. In addition to stained glass work, the club now works with "worm" glass, under the direction of Jan Check. Worm is produced in kilns at heats up to 1600 degrees Fahrenheit in a state-of-the-art kiln room.
When visiting the club, you are impressed with the bee-hive activity of the members as well as the generosity of individuals assisting each other. Rather than having the appearance of a classroom for beginners, it has the aura of a collective commune of artisans working daily to create beautiful works of art. The compassion of this group was illustrated in 2002 when one of the members became terminally ill and could not continue her work on a large piece. All club members took turns working daily on her piece until it was finished. The ill lady was then able to enjoy the beauty of her work of art in her final days, all made possible by loving friends in Glass Art.

## It's Windy Today; No, It's Thurstay

While such misunderstandings amuse those who still have good hearing, the reality is no laughing matter. The frustrated listener experiences confusion, misinformation and increased isolation.
A conversation I had with my husband prior to his investment in hearing aids provides a good example of common miscommunication. One morning, when I mentioned that I needed to buy pizzas for a club social event, he offered to pick them up for me. I remembered I did not know how many or what kind I needed so I told him I would look after it myself later. He was perplexed so repeated his offer and again I declined, Finally his irritation showing, he said," For goodness sakes, woman, I can buy the bloody peaches!"
Although hearing aids have advanced significantly in the last ten years, many situations continue to exist that make it difficult for hearing impaired people. Background music in restaurants and shopping malls, dinner parties with simultaneous conversations, actors mumbling their lines, quiet-speaking people and those with strong foreign accents interfere with the ability to hear or understand.
There are many hearing loss websites such as www.ucsfhealth.org which offer suggestions on how we might assist the hearing impaired.
A few important tips are as follows:

- Face the person and make eye contact as this allows the listener to read lips.
- Avoid putting your hands in front of your face.
- Talk in a normal voice but enunciate clearly.

- Rephrase, rather than repeat, when you have not been understood.
- Say the person's name when you are speaking.
- Background music and noisy appliances should be turned off.

However, electronic devices that transcribe speech into text can be helpful. Above all be patient, as it may well be a windy day!

## Recycling: What Goes Around, Comes Around

Many of us recall the days of our childhood when milk arrived at the front door in glass bottles and when our mothers reused jars to preserve fruits and vegetables. Kitchen waste went into the compost to become the rich soil needed to grow much of our food. Packaged and fast foods, unknown to us, only became popular as we grew into adulthood. What happened? How do we deal with the immense amount of waste thrust upon us today? The modern era of recycling turns back the clock somewhat and allows us, with a bit of effort, to return to a lifestyle reminiscent of earlier times.
How do we dispose of waste we collect from the grocery store, the post office and deliveries from online purchases? Fortunately, Venture Out maintains, through sponsorship of the Green Committee, an excellent program for recycling and continues to improve its efforts each year.
What can we recycle? The blue bins near the dog walk and maintenance shop accept plastic, metal cans, and glass containers as well as milk and juice cartons. Cardboard (flattened) and papers belong in the green dumpster which is then collected by United Fiber who pay our park for the privilege! The Shriners collect aluminum cans and scrap aluminum, which they turn into funds with which to assist children suffering from severe medical challenges.
For those who prefer curb-side pickup, the maintenance men recommend using a 13 gallon white or clear plastic bag. Put all your recycling items in it, tie securely and place on top of the garbage can. The men will sort the items at the recycling bins.
What not to recycle: kitchen waste, Kleenex, meat trays, pizza boxes, coffee grounds and Styrofoam. These items, when included with recycling, contaminate the other items and need to be disposed of in the trash. Wonder what to do with old electronics, unused medications, batteries, paints, chemicals and tires? The city of Mesa arranges a hazardous waste collection four times a year with the next one taking place on Saturday, April 8, 2017, at 2412 Center Street, north of McKellips.
As for those pesky plastic bags from the grocery store, collection bins located in the center and post office await deposits. Last year, the Green Committee collected over 650 pounds of plastic bags. Trex Plastics, a company which creates decking products from plastics, awarded the Committee a picnic bench in exchange for the bags. The bench now resides in the Veterans' Memorial Garden near the front gate.
