## © Manager's Corner

January 27, 2017
This week's occupancy is 1491 or $85 \%$ vs, 1443 the last report and 1509 the year prior. There are currently 405 renters in the park.
The ballots for the Annual meeting (February $15^{\text {th }}$ ) were mailed out or sent electronically last week, immediately following the 'Meet the Candidates' forum. As per the bylaws you have until 4:00 P.M. Tuesday, February $14^{\text {th }}$ to return those ballots. If you are voting with a paper ballot, put a stamp on the envelope and drop it in the mail. Vote Now is a third party contractor which tabulates all the votes, both paper and electronic. They deliver those results with a touch of the button, to the Election Committee on the morning of the Annual Meeting. This year, only 70 ballots were mailed to Canada! Thank you! Canada mailings are always expensive and by utilizing the electronic voting option, there is no longer that four-week turnaround time for most. That was one of the major reasons for using the Electronic voting option. If you still are getting a paper ballot, you can still vote electronically by following the instructions mailed with the ballot. If you do this, please scroll down to the bottom of the ballot and register to vote next year electronically.

We continue to have a little confusion with multiple lot owners not realizing that each unit must be signed up individually, so this year we will make that a priority to reach out to each of those owners and help them get signed up. We also had about 50 e-mails kick back, due to spam filters set too high and we resolved that by sending them in smaller groups. Then another batch of 14 that changed their e-mails but didn't change the e-mail with Vote Now.
We have TWO separate e-mail lists. The Vote Now list is maintained by the contractor and it's the same as if you signed up to vote at the County Recorders offices. Then we have the e-mail list that we maintain here in the Administration office. That list is used for FASTMAIL's, Survey Monkey, communications from the Board, summer newsletter, etc. So if you want to be on both lists, make sure you are signed up separately for each one. We have the instructions in the office how to sign with Vote Now and to sign up for the Admin e-mail list, see Deb Hathcock in our office.

Thank you for the responses to our Survey Monkey Poll with 888 answering our questions. This really helped the Board develop a solid business plan with accurate information. Since it is such an effective way to reach out and get instant input from you, I would expect the Board will probably use it frequently. Again, if you did not get the last Survey Monkey survey, check with Deb Hathcock in the office and get signed up and be part of the process.
The ladies at the front desk tell me that we still have about 500 lot owners/renters who have not yet picked up a phone book for your unit. IF there is not a new phone book in your unit, with the outside sunset photo of the EPC, you do not have the most current version. See Lynette or Olivia for this book. Renters can pick up this book for the lot owner, but please leave it in the unit.
We are in the middle of preparing for next year's budget. If any clubs have MAINTENANCE items we are not aware of, come in ASAP and see Karen Roman so we can plan for this. Note.. this is not to be confused with a Capital project or "addition or alterations" to a common element, which requires a transmittal. Teresa and I try to get around to see the clubs before Budget but as hectic as it is, we don't always make it around to all of them, so this will help us immensely in our budget preparations.
Still a little cold but they are forecasting warmer weather for next weekend. If you ski, they have a 90 -inch base up in Flagstaff!

The Venture Out Handymen's Club was founded in 1979, ten years after the park was organized. The mission of the group is to provide carpentry and repair support to the common elements in the park. This means they work under the direct supervision of the Social Board with the many clubs and activities. Examples of building projects they complete are cabinets, book-shelves, steps, and repairing deteriorating components of the infrastructure. The process begins when one of the clubs decides they need an addition, new furnishings, or upgraded components. They contact the Handymen who then work with club specifications, plans and budget. This goes to Teresa and the Social Board for members in orawing up tne specifications, plans and budget. This goes to Teresa and he Sole approval is secured, the Handymen complete the job and the cost is charged back to the club that made the request. The Handymen cannot make themselves available to individual unit owners because of liability issues.
There are approximately 25 members in the group, with 14-18 active members. They usually work from 1-5 mornings a week. When visiting the club, it appears as busy as a beehive with men continuously on the move, pounding hammers, operating saws, sanding, and other carpentry activities. The requests they receive are as varied as the clubs requesting their services. Al Judsen, president of the group, and Tom Crogan, senior member, reported that their largest job consisted of furnishing the new center in 2005 when it was remodeled. They built all of the cabinets throughout the building, shelves in the library and other rooms, steps up to the stage, trim, hanging all of the mirrors and paintings, etc. They recorded the labor involved and determined it was over 5,000 man hours. Their most unusual request was to help an elderly man using a walker to help unload his van. He had just arrived in the park and had no one to help him and couldn't do it himself. Although this doesn't fall under the mission of the Handymen's Club, several members took assisted him.
To get involved, Tom and Al assured me that you don't have to be "handy" or a carpenter. You just have to show up and put in some time on a regular basis. We can all hold a shelf while someone pounds or sands a board. The coffee is always on and sometimes there are donuts! The men are all wonderful to visit with!

## Lefse

The newest activity in our park is "Lefse baking". Lefse is a Norwegian delicacy similar to a large soft taco, but has different names in Norway depending on the type of lefse and the valley from which it originated. The history of lefse making reveals that it had no beginning; hence it will have no end. A traditional Norse folk tale relates that the Norse God, Odin, first served lefse to the souls of slain warriors who occupy Walhalla as a way to fortify them for battle. The initial prototype of lefse was made of flour. For centuries Norwegian women traveled from house to house and village to village to make lefse that would last for an entire winter. The final product was a large, round and crispy cracker that could be stored indefinitely. When it was time to be served, the cook would dip it in water and soak it between damp cloths until it was softened. It was then enjoyed with butter and sugar. When potatoes were introduced to Norway in the 1700's they were soon substituted for some of the flour in the lefse recipes. The Norwegians who immigrated to the United States and Canada brought their lefse recipes and rolling pins along with them, making the new potato lefse on wood burning cook stoves. It is estimated that there are over 53 million Norwegian descendants who bake lefse on a regular basis.
A group recently reserved the Cabana Room and spent an entire afternoon baking lefse. The reigning "Queens of Lefse" are pictured and include Lois Jean Kamps, Carol Sue Butts, and Barb Agar. Two other queens not pictured are Pam Klokke and Bernadette Carlson. The five lefse queens, along with their assistants Bill Klocke and Keith Gustafson, baked approximately 100 lefses during the afternoon, including a version of lefse that is made of rice rather than wheat for people with gluten sensitivities. The Venture Out Lefse group is dedicated to maintaining the craft, educating non-lefse folk about the wonders of lefse, having fun, and trying to discov-
 er the best lefse recipe ever!

Picture a flat brimmed brown Stetson, a red serge tunic, yellow stripes on blue breeches, and shining high-top brown boots with silver spurs. Add a handle-bar moustache and you have Harley Barr in 1973, a proud member of the Royal Canadian Mounted Police.
Harley, growing up in the impoverished backwoods of New Brunswick, had dreamed of being a policeman since the age of six. Living in a tarpaper shack with dirt floors, no indoor plumbing, and second-hand clothing, the image of the red-coated RCMP officer provided him with the incentive to improve his life. In 1964, after six months of rigorous training, he earned his brown boots and spurs.
After a number of detachment postings in Canada's Maritime provinces, Harley was married with two sons. His marriage failed, but he attained full custody of his three and five year old boys. The RCMP, recognizing that he needed a fresh start, transferred the little family across the nation to St. Albert, Alberta. Here, while maintaining his many detachment duties, Harley cooked and cleaned while raising his sons, using karate as a means of family bonding. Numerous Canadian and provincial karate medals provide evidence of the commitment and success of the family's effort. Harley is a five-time Alberta champion, and four-time Western Canadian champion, earning his last crown at the age of sixty-seven competing against men thirty years his junior.
When his sons graduated from high school, Harley once again had time to cultivate female companionship. He enrolled in a magazine, the Bargain Finder, which contained an advertisement listing Asian and European women wishing to meet and possibly marry Canadian men. A friend, upon hearing that Harley was corresponding with dozens of potential companions, arranged a meeting with a Filipino friend who insisted that "Harley get in touch with her niece, Rowena".
After a visit to the Philippines, enduring the culture shock and close scrutiny of Rowena's family, Harley knew that a spark had been lit. Rowena came to Canada and following a brief courtship, twenty-one year old Rowena and fifty-one year old Harley were married and embarked on a loving relationship that would be filled with travel, hunting, fishing, hiking, karate, tennis, and gardening. When they arrived at Venture Out in 2004, Harley wondered how his much younger Asian wife would be accepted in this retirement community. He need not have worried as Rowena quickly won support by dent of her sparkling personality and willingness to take on any task. She has twice chaired the financially important Fall Classic Tennis Tournament, assumed many leadership positions in tennis and pickle-ball, currently chairs the Christmas Angels' Program, and performs in park fund-raising entertainment programs.
You may encounter Harley on his way to the tennis courts, resplendent in his cowboy hat, fluorescent attire, and brace on his wonky knee. Here is a man who fully embraces life in our retirement community. He has overcome real poverty, succeeded as a single parent while proudly serving as a Mountie, and found a new life partner whom he describes as "easily the best thing that ever happened to him".

## Frank Lloyd Wright Inspired Unit

Terry and Deb Carsten built a unit on Fairchild inspired by the work of the famous architect from Wisconsin and Arizona, Frank Lloyd Wright. The architectural style is considered Contemporary with a "Shed" style roof, a popular design originating in the 1960's. The unit has a hip roof, with the attached shed roof about 2 feet below the eaves of the primary roof. The shed roof covers a wrap-around deck that faces two sides of the unit. The ceiling above the deck area is lower than average. The result is a feeling of coziness while on the deck and the illusion that the other dimensions of the deck are larger. The deck has a built in wet bar, making it efficient for entertaining. Moving from the deck into the unit through double doors makes the interior spaces seem much higher and loftier after coming from the more confined space. The clerestory windows in the Arizona room and kitchen, with the large glass doors throughout the Arizona room, provide abundant amounts of light throughout the unit. The nutmeg colored oak planking used throughout the unit provides a stark contrast to the maple wood cabinets and quartz countertops. The large bay window in the kitchen faces the street and provides a unique dining area as well as a unique architectural feature on the outside.
Other unique features include a built-in loft that is used as a play room for the grandchildren and includes an abundant amount of toys. Cherished accessories in the Arizona room include souvenirs from Jerusalem including a large wooden Noah's ark with two of several kinds of animals and a miniature "Holy City" on a hill. The Carstens' also have a very large, collector's replica of the National Lampoon Dollhouse. The decorating touches, including an entire hallway wall filled with family photos, make the unit feel ultra-modern but also very comfortable and homey.


Ben has seen it all and he has won it all— both as coach and as referee at games and track meets. He has over 300 medals and awards, both national and state wide. In addition, Ben served as a referee for national wrestling meets in many western states. As a result of his volunteer work as a coach and trainer at the YMCA, he was awarded "Layman of the Year" for his efforts. Ben was also nominated for teacher of the year six times in Denver.

Ben Knaub's dedication to sports, and wrestling in particular, began when he was in high school.
 His parents did not approve of his wrestling and would only consent if he completed his chores every night in a timely manner. In order to complete his tasks for his parents approval, Ben often had to run home, a good five miles, because of missing the bus after wrestling practice.
As one of 12 children, Ben was the only one who went to college. He began his teaching career in 1950 in the Denver, Colorado school system and soon after added the coaching of wrestling to his responsibilities. He loved the kids and they loved him. He was a strict disciplinarian, though always fair. His philosophy was that each boy was an individual and important. As a result, he created a personal relationship with each student. Ben had a way of getting the best from each one; they wanted to be successful for him and they performed to their best ability. That was all he expected. Ben says consistency in his approach to coaching was necessary and strong language was never his way of reproaching students. The boys knew what he wanted of them and they knew they had to adhere to his rules of no drugs, alcohol, or cigarettes.
In his coaching days, inner city kids were bussed to his high school for extra curricular activities. He coached wrestling after school and because of the intense training, the inner city students sometimes missed their bus. Ben offered to take them home, a good 25 miles away. Many would ask him to drop them at the corner. He finally figured out that they were ashamed of the shacks they lived in. Many of these students have returned to Ben later in life and told him they might be in prison had it not been for him.
Recently, while living at Venture Out, he was contacted by a former student who now owns and operates a wind generator company. He wanted to show his appreciation to Ben and his wife, Joanne, by presenting them with a dinner out, flowers and $\$ 5,000$. The couple enjoyed a trip to Hawaii with the money. Ben and Joanne have lived in V.O. for many years and he has participated in the V.O. softball teams both as a player and as coach.
With anticipation and excitement, Ben and his family look forward to May, 2017, when he will receive the ultimate honor of being inducted into the National Hall of Fame for coaching wrestling. Along with all this, he also is an excellent dancer. Just ask half the gals at V.O.
A job well done for many years.

Pickle ball began with humble origins in the backyard of Congressman Joel Pritchard of Bainbridge Island, Washington. Searching for a way to keep his children entertained for the summer months of 1965, he lowered the backyard badminton net, then brought out a few ping pong : paddles and a whiffle ball.
