## ELECTION AND ANNUAL MEETING

The Venture Out Social Club, Inc. Annual Meeting and Election will be held Tuesday, March 20, 2018 in the Buena Vista Ballroom. The Annual Meeting will commence at 1:00 p.m. Five (5) candidates will be elected. Three directors will serve three (3) year terms and two (2) will serve two (2) year terms. All active members of the Social Club (which includes each lot owner and spouse) are eligible for one (1) ballot each. In accordance with Article V, Section 3 of the Bylaws, only one (1) vote each (for up to five candidates) will be accepted on the ballot. To clarify who is entitled to a ballot for the Social Club, Inc. we would remind you that the Social Club is made up of people, not lots. Each person has one ballot. If ownership of the unit is in the name of husband, or wife only, the spouse shall also be an active member of the Social Club and allowed to vote. Polls will be open for voting from 12 noon until 1:00 pm the day of the Annual Meeting, Tuesday, March 20, 2018 in the Buena Vista Ballroom. Ballots are also available at the Activity Office, beginning Monday, March 5 ${ }^{\text {th }}$, 2018 until 3:30 pm Monday, March 19, 2018 for those unable to vote on Tuesday, March 20, 2018. Ballots are not allowed to leave the Activity Office. Should there be a hardship, contact the Activity Director. She will schedule a ballot delivery. Be sure to wear your owner's badge when voting.

All contracted classes \& club events are not scheduled from 12:00 noon until the close of the meeting on Tuesday, March 20, 2018, the day of the Annual Meeting and Election. The Activity Office will close for the day at 12 noon.

## VENTURE OUT GOVERNANCE STUDY

## The following remarks were presented to residents at the Annual General Meeting on February 14, 2018.

As many of you will already know, I have been appointed to chair a Governance Study for our park. Kay Hanks, John Jones, and I form an initial Steering Committee to sort through the opinions being expressed in the park and to suggest a governance plan for VO that is fair, clear, unequivocal, and will withstand the test of time.

This search for an effective and efficient governance model for Venture Out is neither a negotiation or mediation designed to find some middle ground that will temporarily satisfy supporters of what has become a partisan issue. This type of conflict is not new in our park. We ask you to put aside loyalties, preconceptions, misconceptions, personality biases, etc. and focus only on the kind of structure that will best serve us all into the future. There should be no "winners" or losers" in this process.

Let me be perfectly clear at the outset that this ad hoc Committee was not formed to inject itself, or be distracted by, the budget approval controversy that has assailed us in 2017/18. That issue is up to our Boards to decide using the existing 2012 Agreement as a guide. Our task is to suggest some adjustments to our present governing structure that will eliminate, or at least significantly reduce, future jurisdictional conflict. If I accept the trending results of my personal interviews conducted with average residents over the past ten days, our study will have to include an evaluation of our present two board structure.

We are a multi-million dollar corporation with some of our hard earned retirement dollars invested in it. Do we, as owners, think it should be led by two elected Boards or by one? If two, what is the mechanism to resolve disagreement in philosophy or priority. If one, what should be the formal relationship with the other without compromising the invaluable contributions we now enjoying. We are looking for the right long term answer. There is no intent to convene a group equally represented by supporters of the Condo Board and the Social Club Board and resume yet another negotiation. Similarly, we are not intending large group sessions at this time, sessions that tend to favor those who are most comfortable with an audience. We want to speak to you as individuals in a comfortable setting to obtain your opinion. We will report out our emerging findings on our website, prior to proposing any new model, hopefully in early April. Recognizing that not everyone is comfortable with the website, we will seek other ways to communicate with you.

We have asked for a calm, reflective approach from all residents in resolving this very important governance issue. We are not necessarily asking you to describe a precise model, but rather, should the governance model be adjusted, to let us know "what worries you" or "what do you fear may be lost". No one on the Committee is even remotely interested in doing away with the Social Club and its vital contributions to our lifestyle. When each of you has thought about it carefully, objectively, intellectually, without bias or passion, the Steering Committee is ready to hear from you. Later, we intend to enlarge the Committee and do group sessions after we have a clearer perception of the feelings of individuals who love Venture Out. In October and November, we plan round table discussions to refine whatever models may be presented. Finally, in November, we hope to make a recommendation that represents the general consensus within our park.

Please stay in contact with the emerging thoughts of the Committee, by logging onto the park website, ventureoutrvresort.com , then click HOA Committees, then vogovstudy, where you will find our reports and the emails and phone numbers of the Steering Committee. While we will obviously accept phone calls, personal contact or emails are much preferred. I, due to travel arrangements made over a year ago, will be out of park during much of March, but will be available by email. Kay and John, also available by email, will be here in the park.

Wish us luck. Our only agenda is to improve life in Venture Out.

## INFORMATIONAL ARTICLE \# 1 from the Governance Study Committee IN PLAIN TERMS

The Social Club, a club comprised of all residents of Venture Out, was formed in 1977 to assist the governing body of Venture Out in the provision of recreational activities to its residents. In 1978, it was granted 501(c)(7), Social and Recreation Clubs tax exempt status, permitting it to conduct fund raising activities without having to report receipts from admissions, membership fees, dues, assessments, and club investments as income.

Organizations who receive tax exempt status must maintain a separate identity and conduct its affairs independently. In our park, the Condo Board may enter into agreements with the Social Club, allow it to use its facilities and staff as may be required, but cannot impose operational practices other than those specified in an Agreement.

The Social Board requires the use of the Condominium Association's facilities, meeting rooms, and staff to conduct its business. In return for this privilege, the Social Board contractually promises to annually provide the Condo Board with its budget that outlines expected expenditures of the revenue obtained from clubs, including any ear-marked projects. The methodology is described in the 2012 Agreement, which requires the Social Board to report its expected income, operating expenses, line item contributions, equipment replacement needs and the disposition of year-end excess funds to the Condo Board. It also affirms that the budget cannot become effective until approved by the Condo Board. The 2012 Agreement, or relevant sections thereof, are available upon request.

The Study Committee does not question the right of the Social Board to independently develop and maintain internal procedures that protect the Social Club's tax exempt status, including rules of how funds are raised, accounted for, and how they are planned to be used for the benefit of all residents of Venture Out. Similarly, the Committee does not question that the Condo Board has the right to ensure that the budget, outlining the intended expenditure plan, presented to them for approval is a realistic portrayal of annual expectations based on previous years' performances, and is consistent with current park priorities and practices. This, after all, is the Agreement.

Nothing in the development of the relationship between the Social Club and the Condominium Association ever envisioned power struggles, name-calling, turf wars, or the use of park funds to cover legal costs to resolve disputes. The Social Club was simply constituted and contracted to assist the Condominium Association with the provision of recreational activities. It has become apparent that in the delivery of these services by its Boards, residents have come to question "who is in charge" or "two Boards are confusing and may be ill-advised".

Is it reasonable to suggest that we, the members of the Social Club, insist that our elected Social Board develop language to create amendments to its Bylaws that clear up these confusions? This review could include the consideration of a name change for the Social Board; the method of selection of the Board; and a reexamination of budget preparation processes. Each change should continue to value the worth and prestige of the Social Board, while at the same time, acknowledging that the Condo Board has the ultimate and final authority in the management of all aspects of our park.

These suggestions do not affix blame to either party but simply suggest that the Social Club may be in the best position to finally resolve the confusion that is impacting relationships in our park. The Condo Board does not have unilateral authority to dictate how the Social Board conducts its affairs, other than requiring the submission of a fully transparent budget for approval.

We will provide further specific thoughts on these questions in future articles and continue to seek your reaction.

# © Manager's Corner 

February 23, 2018

This week's occupancy is 1567 or $90 \%$ vs 1633 the prior count and 1156 the year before. There are currently 369 renters in the park.

Next Monday at 9:00 a.m. in the Oasis, the Condo Board starts their budget process. For those of you who have never sat through this process, it is long and involved, but an excellent example of the detail that the Board undertakes to review each line item before presenting the final budget at the March Town Hall meeting. Probably the biggest item on their plates this year, will be how to determine to get as many transmittals through the process, within the $\$ 90,000$ cap. For those of you who have no idea what a transmittal is, that is the document that generally a club will submit for some kind of capital improvement for their facilities. This year there are 45 transmittals that we are currently working on, I expect the Board to review about 25 of them, the others are more long term or are already in process.
Also on the budget table is the projected street work this year. Most of the west side is slated for seal coat. If your road isn't seal coated (on the west side), it's because the street consultant has projected it for replacement in the near future. Again, that information will be presented at the March town Hall meeting, you can also find the street consultants entire analysis of the roads on the web site.

Additionally, included in this year's budget will be a new street light plan. Two test street lights were installed last summer on the 800 block of Merlin and I understand to the general approval of the homeowners along that street. Our street lights are of course 50 years old on the west side, (the lights are newer), but the biggest problem is that all of the wiring is direct buried, and it is starting to fail. Planning ahead to get a new system installed has been spearheaded by the infrastructure committee and it was also an item that bubbled to the top of the last Long Range Plan survey.

We are nearing spring break time in the park. It is always a busy time. We ask that everyone please pay attention to the rules so that grandchildren and residents can live in peaceful coexistence. One item that came up last year was the pool rules, (who would guess), and if that meant that children were not allowed within the fenced area during hours that children are not allowed. The answer to that is yes, people do expect to have the pool deck as well as the pool, to themselves during those hours. We do think however that between the two pools there should be ample opportunity for children to swim.

This is also the time of year that our water bill spikes by about $\$ 10,000$ due to all of the visitors. Please ask your guests to be mindful of the bathhouse hours and not try to use them when the janitorial crew is cleaning them and help you out by not taking those 30 minute showers!

Olivia and Lynette are busy now assigning RV storage and RV rentals. We have 18 people on a wait list for our RV overnight spots. I guess you can say they are popular.

I hope that everyone can get out an enjoy this beautiful weather and have a great weekend.

You need plans. If you have a contractor, he may have a drafter he uses or you need to find one on your own. Once you have a preliminary drawing, show it to your friends. They may see things you didn't think about, like:

1. Can you see the toilet from your $A Z$ room? Maybe you need to trade places with the sink.

Cows were handmilked for milk, cream, and churned butter, and soap was made from rendered lard. We could not foresee the rows of Saran wrapped packaged products available in our supermarkets of today. There was little talk about sugar content, organic farming, lactose-free products or GMOs.

We generally respected the value of schools, churches, and government. Our parents provided support and encouragement for the often meagrely trained teachers working in single room schoolhouses. Country and small town churches provided the social and cultural hub of neighbourhoods. We trusted our electives representatives who seemed to be more interested in their constituents than the partisan politics we witness today.

Ron and Sharon Laursens' unit on Douglas is reminiscent of a lake or ocean home. The unit has a contemporary architectural style and sports a gorgeous, wrap-around covered deck. The deck is furnished with deluxe wicker furniture including a gliding love seat, several roomy side chairs, ottomans, glass-topped coffee table and end tables. There are two ceiling fans with wicker blades in addition to a bar with stools, built-in BBQ, and fire pit. ## Making a Left Turn

Do you wonder just where to wait when making a left turn? Is it in the intersection, or at the crosswalk?
This is the ruling from the Arizona Department of Transport, Motor Vehicle Division.

## Making a left turn:

When making a left turn at an intersection, enter the intersection when the light turns green and wait for a safe time to turn. Do NOT wait at the stop line of the left turn lane and turn when the light is yellow or red.
In consideration for other vehicles wishing to make a similar turn, it is appropriate to pull into the intersection as far as possible, thereby permitting a second vehicle to wait while fully within the intersection. You are not permitted to straddle the pedestrian lines when waiting.

We hope this helps to clarify the issue.

8. It doesn't matter if it is sub-zero weather, clothes will "freeze-dry."
9. A long wooden pole is needed to push the clotheslines up so that longer items don't brush on the ground and get dirty.
10. ALWAYS gather the clothes pins when taking down dry clothes. Pins left on the lines are "tacky."
11. If you are efficient, line the clothes up so that each item does not need two clothes pins, but share one of the clothes-pins with the next washed item.
12. Clothes must be off the line before dinner time, neatly folded in the clothes basket and ready to be ironed.
13. IRONED? Well, that's another subject altogether.
