## MESA FIRE DEPARTMENT

Please remember that it is imperative that emergency vehicles be able to get to their destination without any obstacles. This means that you may only park on one side of the street. If you or your company need to park on the street and there is already someone else parked somewhere down the street, please be sure you park on the same side of the street as they did. Parking directly across from each other is a bad idea and could tend to increase response time. Ask your company to move their car if need be. Also, please do not walk or bicycle down the center of the streets. Please use all street rules inside our resort as well as outside. This is for your own safety.

## SAFETY \& SECURITY COMMITTEE

 Please DO NOT use a small torch or ANY OTHER FLAME to kill scorpions. There are scorch marks along the dog park wall from people doing this. Not only do you run the risk of starting a fire (Re: no open flame rules), but it leaves unsightly black marks that must be scrubbed off.


## ATTENTION RESIDENTS

On March 28 and March 29 FSEC will be in the park to conduct the yearly Fire Hydrant Inspection as required by Mesa Fire Department and the City of Mesa. Be expecting to see a lot of water in the streets throughout the park as every Fire Hydrant will be tested and inspected. Please plan accordingly. Thank You for your cooperation.

Once again it's weed season. Owners are responsible for keeping weeds cleared off their property. Owners: Before leaving for the summer, apply a pre-emergent to your property to help prevent continued growth of unwanted weeds. If you are a renter, please notify the owner to have the weeds removed and the lot pretreated with a pre-emergent. Owners: Please notify the Venture Out Chief of Security as to who you are leaving in charge of your property and will be responsible for weed removal. Thank You for your cooperation in keeping our park beautiful.

Numerous bikes have been reported stolen from the park since the beginning of the season. Security takes this very seriously and we try to do everything we can to keep this from happening. Please know that Security is not responsible for stolen property but together we can take measures to try to prevent this from happening. Please make sure you register your bikes with Security and please make sure you are keeping them locked up when not being used. If your bike is stolen please report it to Security immediately so an incident report can be filled out and kept on file. You will want to contact Mesa PD and file a stolen property report with them as well. Please report any suspicious activity you may see in the park immediately to Security. Thank You

Please remember that upon entering the Hobby Shop area traffic flow is one direction to the right ONLY!! For safety reasons PLEASE do not turn left and go against the proper flow of traffic.

Please stop by the Administration Office and pick up your copy of the Mesa PD "Summerizing Your Arizona Home" brochure. This is a great brochure for those of you who leave Venture Out for the summer and will help you prepare your home for the summer before you leave.

Please make sure when you enter through the back gate that no one follows you in who doesn't belong in the park. If you should see someone follow you in that looks suspicious, PLEASE contact Security immediately.

## Suggested Closure Checklist

Here are a few suggestions on how to get your unit ready for the long hot summer months ahead. Remember, careful planning and preparation now can help you avoid costly repairs when you return next season.

## 1. Check out at Administration Office:

Check for keys, and list of whom can borrow keys.
If you are having renters, ensure your Third-Party forms have been turned in AND paid for.

Update your directory information: email, phone number, summer address.
2. Check out at Post Office - Fill out forwarding address forms if necessary.
3. Avoid water damage - inspect your outside main water supply fitting for signs of leaks and/ or corrosion then turn off the valve - don't block or close your drains. This will allow water to run straight through the drains. If possible, padlock the shut off.
4. To keep your $p$-traps from drying out - pour in approximately one cup of mineral oil.
5. Turn off your hot water heater and run it until it is cool.
6. Clean your gutters so the rain water has a place to go and does not back up under the shingles and run into your unit.
7. If you DO NOT have low-e window, then put in silver shades to repel the summer heat.

If you have low-e Do NOT cover the windows with anything but pull the shades and curtains. Covering the window will cause damage to your window and glass.
8. Remove all fruit from your trees to avoid roof rats.
9. Check drainage around your unit to make sure the water drains away from the unit in case of a large monsoon rain. Maintenance has sand bags available for you to place around your ground level Arizona Rooms. Do Not leave anything of value or furniture on ground level. Put all furniture up on blocks or inside your unit. Make sure the weep holes in the block wall are free of plants and debris so water can drain.
10. Weed Control - use Ortho Ground Clear (without 2-4-d) to put on your yard to help maintain weed control in the summer. Also, you may want someone who stays in the park for the summer to check on your yard to see if it's effective after summer rains. Green Committee recommends any pre-emergent weed killer that does not have 2-4-d. They recommend you read the label especially the fine print.
11. Golf Carts - Disconnect the batteries. If possible, see if you can find someone to either store the cart for you or charge it once a month, fill it with water and run the cart a little monthly.

## Suggested Closure Checklist

12. Do not store wood directly on the ground, under or around your unit as it will attract termites.
13. Replace batteries in the smoke detectors.
14. Check refrigerator - it should be defrosted, be cleaned (including bottom tray) and both refrigerator and freezer doors held open with folded bath towels. An alternate - put one cup uncooked ground coffee beans in refrigerator and close doors.
15. Check stove and oven - clean if needed.
16. Dispose of all food items, except spices. Place small amount of bay leaves in food cupboards.
17. Check all storage areas for perishables.
18. Store all cooking utensils and small appliances in cupboards as space permits.
19. Run garbage disposal until thoroughly clean. Pour $1 / 2$ cup of mineral oil, flick on and off and add another $1 / 2$ cup of mineral oil. Available at Wal-Mart and most drug stores. Or spray with WD-40.
20. Turn off water to the toilet. Flush toilet several times to clean drain of any solids. Sponge out most of the water in stool and pour in enough mineral oil to cover water. Leave water in the tank.
21. Make sure all bedding, towels and laundry are dry, clean, folded and stored in cupboards.
22. Disconnect small electrical appliances - TV, toaster, coffee maker, etc. Remove batteries from clocks, flashlights, remote controls, etc.
23. Lower any window awning on trailer, if applicable.
24. Turn off electricity at meter. You may lock electric pedestal door.
25. Check skirting openings to be sure they are in place and secure.
26. Pour a quart of RV antifreeze in dishwasher and clothes washer. Pour $1 / 2$ cup in drain stand pipe behind clothes washer.
27. Close all propane gas cylinder valves tightly.
28. Cover TV, VCR, Computer, etc. with sheets or towels to prevent dust from infiltrating the working parts.

# (1) Manager's Corner 

March 23, 2018
This week's occupancy is 1619 or $93 \%$, vs 1640 two weeks prior and 1493 the year prior. There are currently 419 renters in the park. We continue to have much higher occupancy this year by a wide margin.
The Condo Board is still making some last-minute adjustments on their budget and as of this writing, have not formally passed it. Therefore, they will publish the budget in the next Outlines and as always we include it in the summer mailing/e-mail. As soon as it is finalized it will also be found on line, on the private page of the web site. The new web site is popular with just over 1500 residents registered to access the 'back page'.
While there are many fixed costs the Board must deal with each year, there are a series of costs that are best described as 'choices'. That is the area that often takes the most time to deliberate.

This year, the greatest impact on the budget will be the street work, including seal coating almost the entire west side of the park. This should go a long way towards eliminating the black dust on that side of the park. As I stated before, if you live on the west side and your street is NOT seal coated, that is because it is slated for replacement in the near future. Next summer (2019) the east side of the park would be seal coated.

New street lights will be installed on the streets that are being replaced. This will be a multiyear project, phased in with the street replacement. The street light design, was done by one of our Infrastructure members, Dick Jennings, who has literally hundreds of hours into the design. The street program when it was first drafted by our street consultant (Denis Ericson) in 2016, extends for eight years. This will be the third summer of that eight-year plan. Each year, he comes back into the park, evaluates the streets to see if they are holding up as he predicted and then modifies the plan if necessary. During the summer he supervises the contractors to make sure they are meeting his specifications. To my knowledge, Denis has dropped all his contracts with the exception of Venture Out, as he is trying to 'retire'. So when you see him out there, please, thank him for hanging in there with us. He is a great asset to the community.

This summer we have also budgeted for a drainage plan, in conjunction with the City of Mesa. Last summer the City contacted our office and asked if we had flooding in the community. I responded yes and sent them a list of units that had flooded over several years, when hit with heavy rain. They used that information and received a grant for some additional flood control along Broadway. This past season, Infrastructure met with the City on this new project and at this time we expect to be able to tie into that system when it is built. We expect that the City work would start sometime in 2019 and assuming the City approves our plan, we would be doing some modifications in the retention basin around the same time frame.

Another item in the budget, is a conceptual design cost for the Hobby Center, Bocce expansion, Sewing addition, Admin, West Pool, etc. The Planning Committee, after working on the Long Range Plan and the many transmittals submitted in the last two years, requested the Condo Board, budget some funds for an overall conceptual design, that will take you through the next ten to fifteen years. In order to know where you are going, you first have to understand the needs. Next season the architect chosen for that design work, will come into the park, work with the 'end users/club members' as well as the Committees assigned to this project to develop that design.

The last big piece of the budget that took a lot discussion were the transmittals. Transmittals are most often capital recreational projects submitted to the Condo Board by the clubs. This year, after budget approval, (assuming there are no changes) twenty-three transmittals will be approved and moved on to me to implement during the summer. Keith Kettle and I will work closely to complete those projects prior to the end of the summer, along with the normal maintenance items.
The Green Committee took a recent tour of the Salt River Landfill and since it is not affiliated with the City of Mesa, if you pay a $\$ 10$ fee you can drop off old TV's at this facility. We will continue to take the old TV's up through April $30^{\text {th }}$, (the end of season). After that, TV's will need to be taken over to this Landfill.

Rusty was adopted at age 2 by George and Linda. He had previously been adopted by two others couples and returned. In both cases it was reported that he would chew their belongings when they were out. George's theory is that Rusty missed human contact during the day and he chewed out of boredom. George took it upon
 himself to train Rusty as an obedient therapy dog. He is now a registered member of the Pet Visitation Program.

Rusty's story of compassionate service began quite by accident. George had a jogging buddy whose father was dying. His friend asked if he would smuggle Rusty into the hospital at night to comfort his Dad. The benefits of Rusty's visit were immediately apparent in the response Rusty elicited from the dying man. George reported that many other patients in the hospital requested to have Rusty visit their rooms as well. Rusty's career was off and running. He and George have clocked over 2500 hours visiting people suffering from illnesses or language barriers.

Rusty is currently the mascot for both the St. Boniface hospital and the Manitoba Medical School in Winnipeg. He has been named the Volunteer of the Year and the longest serving therapy volunteer for St. Boniface. He is also the spokesperson for the lottery that makes contributions to St. Boniface Hospital. Other visitation venues have been English as a Second Language (ESL) programs, elementary education classrooms, the Food Bank program, nursing homes and other health care facilities. Rusty has made numerous television appearances and is featured on T-shirts and other advertising media.

Meeting Rusty is an experience that cannot be described. He exudes a sense of acceptance, compassion, gentleness and love. You can see it in his eyes, in his fluffy fur, and his willingness to interact. You can learn much more about Rusty by typing [rustytherapydogglasses] in your search engine. You will be directed to numerous sites acknowledging Rusty's accomplishments and awards.
