Manager's Corner

March 9, 2018

This week's occupancy is 1632 or 93% vs. 1655 at the last count and 1551 one year prior. There are currently 421 renters in the park.

At the Tuesday night Town Hall, we had presentations that covered everything from the Past, Present and the Future of the park, by Gary Johnson, Solar production by Ken Winters, and Budget and Reserve projections by Bert Sebastian. All presentations were very informative and will also be posted on the web site. An abbreviated version will be found in the Out-Lines two

weeks from now, after we have the time to condense the information.

During the Town Hall meeting Bert did try to answer, what does staff do during the summer? Well...in addition to maintenance of all the recreational facilities, we have 25 major buildings and multiple small facilities/sheds that all require routine maintenance each summer. Some buildings such as the Community Center, the EPC, Oasis, all the bathhouses and pools are completely stripped down, cleaned and inspected, for paint and repairs, mechanical inspections etc. Bathhouses are 50 years old and in good shape as they are routinely stripped, waxed, re-grouted and prepared for the next season. During season, Staff picks up garbage three days a week and landscaping is slower in growth due to the temperatures. In the summer it reverses, trash is down to a few hours a week, which conveniently coincides with the summer rapid growth cycle of landscaping. Staff is constantly trimming and mowing rotating through the park. Irrigation repairs never stop and summer is also the time that maintenance spreads out and fixes stand pipes on individual homes and any major repairs that may have come up as well.

There is a long list of preventative maintenance items, State and City inspections that are due every summer as well. Just as your home would fall into disrepair if not maintained it is also true for all the structures and facilities at VO. It is especially true in AZ as the intense summer heat takes its toll on everything and breaks down the common elements that much faster.

Both Admin and Recreation have long lists of projects as well. Recreation prepares for the next season's events, concert bookings, menu plans and assigns around 10,000 space reservations for the next season. Admin publishes the summer newsletter and the phone book and supervises all the construction projects during the summer as well as the 'always fun' palm tree trimming time. At the end of last summer, we had over 222 projects listed on my "To Do" list that were projects over and above routine maintenance. Only *ONE* of those 222 items, was the North East Sports Complex!

A few quick other items:

A resident in the park, Barb Smith, who is from Vancouver BC and is currently on the faculty of the British Columbia Institute of Technology is asking for some help. She is working on some research, titled "Seasonal Lifestyle Migration of Canadian Snowbirds: The Social and Economic impacts in Arizona 55 + communities' She has asked our Canadians, if you have the opportunity, that you go to her on line survey and fill that out. She greatly appreciates any help you can give her. You can find that survey at: http://bcit.fluidsurveys.com/surveys/bcit-ltc/canadian-snowbirds-seasonal-migration-to-arizona/

Another lot owner asked that we remind residents to not feed the birds. In such close proximity to each other, one person's joy is another person's scourge and we are also battling an ever-increasing pigeon population, which costs you all to try to control.

There have been some scam calls in the park, from someone representing themselves to be DISH wanting to talk to you about your account. DISH is not going to call you unless you have called them first. Hang up.

Please don't leave tires at the dumpsters. This again costs everyone in the park to have those removed. They cannot be placed in the trash; our staff must crawl inside the trash containers and dig them out.

Everyone should be getting their property tax valuations soon. If you do not get yours .go to, phone or mail as follows:

- You may also receive a separate valuation notice for the trailer if you have not filed an Affidavit of Affixture. Use your Vin# to check for mailing address.
- Should you wish to appeal your valuation, you must "Petition for Review of Valuation "it must be filed within 60 days of notice. You cannot wait until Tax Bill is received in October/November to appeal, by then it is too late. It is also possible for some seniors to apply for a Senior Valuation which freezes your valuation and helps protect against increases in tax bills.

Finally, the Condo Board has all financial documents, budgets, reserve fund study, and financials posted on the 'back page' of the web site: Follow the links...RESIDENT LOGIN > DOCUMENTS, FORMS AND LINKS > financial. Then scroll down until you see all the various direct links. Once the Condo Board approves the budget it will be posted there as well as printed in the Out-Lines.

Venture Out Memorial Trust Fund

The Venture Out Memorial Trust Fund, suggested by former owner Chet Rice and created by the Social Board, decided to offer the opportunity for families and friends of deceased residents to contribute money to a fund used for the benefit of all the residents in the park. Instead of placing small individual plaques throughout the park, a number of large plaques with the names of those memorialized would be hung in the Community Center.

This trust, established in 1995, is separate from all other funds and is administered by a committee appointed by the Social Board. The committee has its own financial account.

Since its inception, the Memorial Trust Fund has helped to purchase the following items: microphone and sound equipment, equipment used by Channel 17, a large contribution toward the building of the elevator in the previous Community Center, the purchase of computer and equipment for the AV group, the cost of applying for the Tax Exempt Foundation, money toward expenses for the construction of the Barbecue Pit area, and in 2015, \$3700 for 10 benches throughout Venture Out.

The committee follows definite guidelines. Any contributions received are considered CASH GIFTS; therefore, any DESIGNATED GIFTS cannot be accepted. All checks are to be made out to Venture Out Social Club.

The cost of the bronze nameplate, the engraving, the stationery and postage used for communicating with relatives of the deceased totals nearly \$25 per person.

When making a contribution to the Fund, be sure to indicate that you want your donation to go to the Memorial Fund so that it will be used for engraving the memorial plaques and be placed in the Memorial Account to fund such projects as are listed above. Contributions must be at least \$25. More is appreciated.

We urge you to view the plaques on the wall near the Sonoran in the Baja Bistro. For those who wish to pay it forward (purchase your plaque now), you may do so, but at a minimum of \$25; again, more is appreciated.





GOVERNANCE STUDY - INFORMATIONAL ARTICLE 2

WHAT'S IN A NAME

The name ascribed to a group usually evokes an immediate thought of the role of that group. The term "Board" suggests a group of people directing an organization. Having two significant Boards in a park such as ours can give rise to some confusion, both in terms of their respective function and authority.

Some have suggested that consideration be given to change the name of the Social Board and in so doing clearly distinguish it from the Condo Board. We would still have two Boards, but only one using that designation. This should not be confused with changing the name of the Social Club which is a registered tax exempt corporation.

What name could replace the use of the term "Board". The use of "Committee" seems to diminish the significance of a group that has the organizational and financial responsibilities of our Social Board. The term "Advisory" does not adequately capture the full scope of responsibilities of our Social Board. Some have suggested "Recreation Commission", or "Recreation Directorate", or "Recreation Council" as being more commensurate with the significant responsibilities of our Social Board. It seems to most that the continued use of "Director" does not cause confusion.

The suggestion to consider a name change has no sinister intent. It is the name that may be changed, not the significant role of the group. Similarly, it should not be seen as frivolous in that a name change might well contribute to lessening confusion.

What do you think?

GOVERNANCE STUDY - INFORMATIONAL ARTICLE 3 ELECTED OR APPOINTED...

It has been suggested that two very similar Board elections occurring within our park within months of one another tend to add to our jurisdictional confusion. The only real alternative to elections is a carefully administered appointment process. Assuming that our Condo Board would continue to be selected by election, then for the sake of argument, let us assume that the Directors of the Social Board would be appointed. How might that look?

Since the Social Club is an independent corporation, its Board appointments would be managed through its existing Board, not by the Condo Board. Please remember that describing an appointment scenario is not recommending it, but simply presenting it as an option for consideration.

SCENARIO 1

Assuming that the currently elected Social Board is in place and needs three replacements, a similar appointment method currently in use by several of our Advisory Committees might be undertaken. These committees often have nine members, serving staggered terms, resulting in three vacancies each year. The existing Committee solicits applications from candidates from within the park who have special talents that match its needs; formally interviews them, and submits their names for approval by the Condo Board. Since the Social Club is an independent corporation, the final approval step would not be necessary. This process should produce three new Board members, each committed and fully competent to take on some special responsibilities.

SCENARIO 2

Again assuming that the currently elected Board is in place and that three members will be replaced, the presidents of the various clubs in the park could be asked to recommend three or more of their number, or a resident(s) they would like to represent them, to be interviewed by the Social Board to fill the three open seats. This process, if repeated each year, would likely produce a Board somewhat dominated by past and present club presidents.

SCENARIO 3

What are your ideas?

The Social Club and its Board may see advantages to a responsible appointment process. Such a process would ensure that prospective Board members are committed and fully competent; have a diversity of skills and opinions; and are not discouraged from running by the very public nature of the election process, including having to deal with a potential defeat at the polls. The change, if desired, would require an amendment to Article II, Section 2 of the Social Club Bylaws, which states that its Board is to be elected. Any amendment change to a Bylaw requires a majority vote of at least 25% of active Social Club members.

If the decision is taken to retain the electoral process, it is suggested that some steps need to be taken to make the process look somewhat less like the process being utilized by the Condo Board. Those details would need to be developed by the Social Board, or a resident committee, formed for that purpose.

The foregoing is intended to illustrate that both an election process and an appointment process can produce desirable results. Neither process can guarantee the selection of an effective Director or Board. If nothing else, the appointment process, combined with a potential name change, would further underline the difference existing between our current two Boards in our park.
