This week's occupancy is 1576 or 90% vs. 1531 at the last reporting and 1584 a year prior. There are currently 416 renters in the park.

The Canadian ballots have been mailed and the U.S. ballots will be in the mail in this next week. Electronic ballots will be sent out also next week. Please look in your mail box for the ballot and check your spam box in case it lands there. Even though there are no burning issues this year and we only have three candidates for the Board, we still need your vote to achieve a quorum.

We have had some plumbing problems in the rear easements recently. We have many new lot owners, who are not aware, that if there are pavers or concrete in the easement and we must tear into that to access water lines, sewer, electrical etc., that it is at the lot owners' expense to restore those back. Concrete cannot be re-poured in the easement. In some cases, pavers extend past the easement and into the common element property that is along the wall on the perimeters of the property. That strip of land does not belong to the lot owner but rather the Association. The owners can utilize it, but nothing permanent should be placed there. We have an excellent hand out in these week's outlines about the easements and the many issues we run into. I hope everyone will take the time to read this and then again, step outside and take a look around. Is there something that you can do today, that is simple and will help clear those easements?

We are in preparation now for budget. All transmittals that will be considered for this next year's budget cycle are in. The cut off date for transmittals was January 15th. Any transmittal that comes in from this date forward, is not considered for the upcoming budget.

What is a transmittal, some of you might say? It's a request, generally from a club, but they have come in from individual lot owners as well, for an "addition or alteration to a common element". These transmittals go through a long process, being vetted by the Condo, Social, Common Facilities Planning Committee and, in some cases, the Long-Range Planning Committee, Infrastructure and Security. There are many eyes that review them, before they reach the Condo Board for deliberation, a vote and funding. Sandy Hanson has volunteered for many years now to be the 'Transmittal Wrangler', and it's a daunting task to keep track of all of them, what stage they are in, and 'where to next', when they clear a committee. At times it's a bit like 'herding cats. We owe her a big thanks for taking on this task.

I overheard a conversation the other day about how long an underage person can be in the property. It seems like just yesterday to me that this was such a huge issue in the community, but I forget that it's been over 13 years since the Lot owners voted on a very comprehensive 55 plus policy in the community. Enforcing those policies which are found in both the declarations and the rules portion of your Governing documents, is what allows you to maintain your 55 plus status. The declarations and rules are critical to VO, so please read them again and refresh your memory.

Each year we average about 115 new homeowners in the community. That means the population will make a complete turn about every 15 years. It's totally natural as we all age, but it makes us aware in management and the Board, that we need to find ways to repeat our messages more effectively. The interesting thing I see, is how much younger the park has become in recent years. Our demographic average age has dropped from 75 in 2001 to just above 70 now. The Long-Range Planning that is going on now, with the architects, is to insure, that you continue to capture that next generation and keep VO a great place to live.

Have a great weekend, and if you have never done so, consider going up north for the 'Greatest Show on Grass', its very entertaining.

I encourage you to watch the evening events on Channel 17 to learn more about who will be representing you on the Board next season. And don't forget to vote!

For those of you who use **the Pet Walk area**, I am sure that you noticed that the bridge is out – no longer there. A big thanks to volunteers Al Thomson, Bill Lees, Brad White, Conlin Smith, Dale Walker, Doug Williamson, Elko Kroon, Glen Stover, Ken Winters, Lon Fessenden, Norm Lawrence, Ray Danner, Ray Wirta and Warren Lee. And an even bigger thank you to Bert Sebastian, who organized and led the group. On 2/18/19 they all gathered and took the bridge down in less than 2 hours. They were fortified by Chris Johnson, Pet Association President and Lorraine Hee, Social Board President who provided donuts and coffee. It is hoped that the new bridge will be in place – to be built by the same volunteers – within a few weeks.

Volunteers like this, who share their talents and time, are what make Venture Out great!

We all know that **Arizona has a water shortage.** I have said this before, but many of us come from parts of the country where there is no shortage. While we do not pay for water individually, we do pay for it collectively. I have heard people comment about how nice it is to take 20 or 30 minute showers at the bath house or the pool – mainly because in our homes the hot water runs out way before then and it does not feel like they are paying for it somehow. As guests in Arizona, we need to do our part to conserve water. Also, please talk to your guests about the seriousness of wasting water.

The Board heard a progress report from Bruce Johnston, who is working with Terry Warren and Dennis Olsen to **explore Voice Over Internet (VoIP)** phone and internet services. In the report they also talk about point to point microwave transmission (PTPMW). Confused yet? Their next report will be given at our January 31st Board meeting work session – come and learn about the future at VO.

The **West Pool ad hoc committee** has begun work and members of that committee include Beryl Willerton, Condo as Chair, Kay Hanks, soon to be Condo Director, Lorraine Hee, Social Board with Teresa Beally as backup, David Fauss and Robbie Oldemar as Resident representatives, Mike Flick from Infrastructure, Cliff Seville from Safety and Security committee, Keith Gustafson from Architecture and someone from planning committee. They will keep us all informed as their work progresses.

SPEEDING – everyone does it but you, right? I have heard recently from a number of residents who wonder why more speeding tickets are not written. Source of information of course is the number listed in Outlines under the Security report. I just talked with Brandon and he will in future Outlines (not this one) also list the number of warnings and conversations that Security has with residents regarding their speed. Security personnel have a large responsibility and catching speeders is just one of them. And of course, just like when driving outside VO, there is never 'a cop' where the speeder is. First time speeders are given a warning. A second time speeder will get a ticket. You can and should report a chronic speeder to Security and they do go and talk with people. A guest caught going 18mph recently told Security when they were stopped and told to slow down, 'too bad, I am a guest'. When Security told them that their Grandparents would be getting the ticket as they are responsible for their guests, the person changed their tune pretty fast. Yes, you are responsible for your guests – please explain the rules to them and ask them to follow them.

So, in looking on line, there are **Speed Cameras** that can be posted to take pictures of speeders. They cost around 7,300 but there could be a quick return on investment if we ticketed all speeders – it would probably pay for itself in no time. Just an idea – I would much rather that everyone monitored themselves, slowed down and went the speed limit.

As you already know, the hour that the **back gate** stays open has reverted back to 8pm. There was a good discussion at our 1/17/19 meeting about how late to keep that gate open with the decision made to go back to the 8pm - Security concerns were the deciding factor.

Plan to attend our **Annual Meeting and Election** on February 13th in the Community Center Ballroom at 1pm. The agenda for that meeting includes reports from standing committees such as Safety and Security, Planning, Green, Legislative and many more. You will also hear from the Directors who are leaving the Board this year – Terry Farris, John MacDonald and Gene Waters. The new Condo Board then meets the next day, on February 14th to elect officers for the 2019/2020 season and on February 15th we have Board Orientation. Not long after, on February 25th we go into Budget meetings for a week.

You will find in this edition of Outlines an insert written by Gary Johnson, VP Condo Board on **Utility Easement & Compliance – A Responsibility for all of us.** Please read the insert and take steps to correct any area that you may have that is out of compliance. We live in a very close community and yes, there are rules. You will be hearing more about easements in the future, in the meantime, look out your back door!

I know that this is a long report – but I do want you to be informed about what is going on with the Condo Board – and of course there is always Channel 17 – I probably need a kick back for all the promotions I do for them!

Architectural Committee

Did you know that Venture Out has an Architectural Committee? The purpose of this committee is to support the work of the Condominium Board by considerating architectural issues and informing lot owners about the Venture Out Architectural Guidelines. The committee consists of seven appointed lot owners with voting authority for a three year term and includes one member from the Condominium Board as well as the Venture Out Architectural Inspector.



The Committee meets on the first or second Tuesday of each month from November through March and whenever a special meeting is required. They update the relevant VO Architectural Regulations and Governing Documents and maintain current knowledge of the City of Mesa architectural guidelines. Recommendations are made annually to the Condo Board for changes in guidelines in order to reflect existing permissible practices, and to provide clarity. Input is solicited from the Planning Committee regarding types of housing and other facilities considered appropriate for Venture Out. The Committee considers requests from the Condominium Board and responds with recommendations in regard to variances and issues such as decks, shades, storage units, grills, etc. The Committee sponsors an annual "Open Forum and Information Sharing Session" for all lot owners and contractors. They were closely involved during the past two years with the water stand survey and recommendations.

Questions about compliance, new units, renovations, landscaping, decks, awnings, and outdoor surfaces should be directed to the Architectural Inspector. The role of this committee will be significantly impacted by the approach of 2040, the date targeted for all units in Venture Out to be in compliance with the SRP Agreement.

Safety on the Streets

As warmer weather approaches and the park residency reaches it's maximum, more people will be out and about on the streets. Its worth taking time to review a few simple procedures designed to keep us all safe.

Illumination at night is likely the most important of all tips. Walkers and cyclists should always choose light colored clothing and ensure they have lights both front and back. A walker with a flashlight facing forward, is still dark from the back. A reflective vest and good lights both front and back ensure that drivers can see you.

- Walkers should stay on the sidewalks where possible, but still taking care where vehicles protrude from driveways.
- Cyclists need to ride with the usual traffic flow and obey the usual traffic rules.
- Vehicles should always adhere to the 10 mph speed limit and obey stop signs. When stopped in a parallel fashion on the streets, check the roadway for cyclists or walkers before opening the door.
- All vehicles should indicate through hand signals or flashers their intentions to turn.
- And last of all, do not drive, cycle or walk while involved with your cel phone.

A few minutes of preparation prior to leaving your lot could make the difference!!

Death and Dying in the Age of Denial; a Book Review

Being Mortal by Dr. Atul Gawande traces the history of elder care in the United States ending with what is available today. It is easy reading with many stories that make it come alive. It also discusses hospices, with which I was familiar, but I was not familiar with palliative care. What a difference that could have made when my mother became ill.

"Palliative care is teamwork consisting of clinical detective work to find the origins of patients' symptoms in order to

offer the best possible palliation; of attention to the psychological needs and resilience of patients and their families; honesty and truth in the face of advancing disease; and recognition that each patient is a unique, whole person who is the key member of the team."

I wish I had known the questions they asked:

- 1. Do you understand what is happening to you (or your mom, or sister)?
- 2. Do you understand what your doctors are telling you?
- 3. What are you most afraid of?
- 4. What are your goals?
- 5. What trade-offs are you willing to make, e.g. less medication for clearer thinking, or no more chemo to avoid the side effects?
- 6. Do you understand the consequences between living for the best possible today versus sacrificing the now for the hope of time later?
- 7. What else do you need to know to make a decision? The decisions don't stop. They are relentless.

Would my Mom have chosen not to have her last two surgeries? Would my brother have healed the breach between the two of them? Did she get to say important goodbyes? I'll never know.

Being Mortal should be read by every one who is aging as well as their children. Also, read With the End in Mind by Dr. Kathryn Mannix, a palliative care doctor. Both are good reads with lots of information. Both are available in hard cover at the Mesa libraries or purchase on line, either new or used.

- THE UTILITIES THAT MAY BE IN THE EASEMENT ARE WATER, SEWER, IRRIGATION, TELEPHONE, CABLE TV AND, OF COURSE, ELECTRICAL
- THIS AREA IS ALSO PROVIDED FOR EMERGENCY PERSONNEL TO REACT TO NECESSARY RESPONSES THAT THEY MIGHT BE REQUIRED TO PERFORM
- THINK ABOUT THAT....IF THIS AREA IS NOT CLEAR, YOU MIGHT BE RESPONSIBLE FOR YOUR NEIGHBOR NOT GETTING THE RESPONSE THEY NEEDED.
- IT MIGHT ALSO BE YOUR HOUSE THAT IS ON FIRE AND THAT FIREFIGHTERS ARE DELAYED TO GETTING TO IT BECAUSE OF OBSTRUCTIONS

CAN I HAVE ANYTHING IN THE EASEMENT AREA?

YES, YOU MAY

THE ONLY ITEMS THAT MAY BE IN THE EASEMENT MUST BE PORTABLE AND EASILY MOVED BY ONE PERSON

SRP AND VO ENTERED INTO AN AGREEMENT IN MAY OF 2010 THAT PLACES ADDITIONAL LIMITATIONS AND RESTRICTIONS ON YOUR RIGHT, AS A LOT OWNER, TO USE THAT PART OF YOUR PROPERTY

PLEASE NOTE, THAT THE AGREEMENT BETWEEN SRP AND VO WAS ENTERED INTO FOLLOWING NEGOTIATIONS ON WHO SHOULD PAY FOR THE UPDATING OF OUR ELECTRICAL SERVICES. BY ENTERING INTO THE AGREEMENT, WE AS LOT OWNERS, SAVED MILLIONS OF DOLLARS IN UPGRADING COSTS. OUR PART WAS TO CLEAR OUR FIVE FOOT EASEMENTS.

WE NEED TO DO OUR PART AND HONOR THAT AGREEMENT.

APRIL 30, 2040 RULE -

BY APRIL 30, 2040 ALL LIVABLE STRUCTURES WITHIN VO HAVE TO BE IN COMPLIANCE. MEANING, LIVABLE STRUCTURES CANNOT HAVE ANY PART OF THE STRUCTURE IN THE FIVE FOOT EASEMENT AREA.

LIVABLE STRUCTURE IS DEFINED AS AN AIR CONDITIONED/ HEATED PARK MODEL WITH A KITCHEN, BATHROOM AND BEDROOM AND INCLUDES AN AIR CONDITIONED/HEATED AZ ROOM ATTACHED TO THE COMMON WALL OF THE PARK MODEL



NON- COMPLIANT LIVABLE STRUCTURE

WHEN YOU HAVE TO MOVE A LIVABLE STRUCTURE

WHEN ONE OF THREE THINGS HAPPEN

- 1. THE LIVABLE STRUCTURE HAS TO BE MOVED BECAUSE OF A FAULT IN THE EXISTING UNDERGROUND ELECTRICAL LINES.
- 2. IF A LIVABLE STRUCTURE DOES NOT MEET EASEMENT REQUIREMENTS, COMPLIANCE MUST BE ACHIEVED PRIOR TO ANY CONSTRUCTION WHICH REQUIRES A VO AND CITY OF MESA BLDG. PERMIT
- 3. APRIL 30, 2040

STAND ALONE SHEDS RULES AND REGULATIONS
