# © Manager's Corner 

February 8, 2019
This week's occupancy is 1598 or $91 \%$ vs. 1576 at the last reporting and 1633 a year prior. There are currently 427 renters in the park.

Ballots are slowly coming in, a total of 737 now, so we are still short of a quorum. Even though we do not have any burning issues, we still need to have you vote to meet quorum. Please check your e-mail and your spam mail for your ballot if you have not already voted. The annual election is next Wednesday February $13^{\text {th }}$ at 1:00 P.M. in the Buena Vista Ballroom. We will see you there!

This month, we have been evaluating all the roof top HVAC units at the Community Center. The reserve study has these units scheduled to be replaced in this calendar year. I thought we could probably get a few more years out of them until it was pointed out that these units all use freon or R-22, which will no longer be available for use after January 1, 2020. If any unit sprang a leak, (which we have had a few), we would not have the necessary refrigerant readily available for a leak. There are options, that they call 'drop in' replacement refrigerants, that may or may not work with the units, but they are likely to not cool as well as freon and can have as much as a drop of $15 \%$ in efficiency. In these cases, older units plus repair costs vs. the better efficiency of the new units, it makes sense to replace.

That of course made me think, just how many older HVAC units do we have out there? How many older HVAC units are on homeowners' homes? This also applies to refrigerators. This would be a good time to assess how old your AC is on your home as well as refrigerators and if manufactured before 2010, you might want to make a plan to eventually replace these on your time schedule rather than when an emergency forces you to do so.

A big improvement this summer will be installing a new $12^{\prime \prime}$ drain pipe in the retention basin of the pet walk. This is a combined effort with the City of Mesa and will have the same affect as a drain in the bottom of the bathtub. We will be able to empty the basin directly into the City storm sewer system. For the year-round residents that are often having to put up with two to three days to drain the basin, and only with Roosevelt Water Districts approval, this will be a game changer. If we can start to empty the basin the minute, it rains we hope it will lessen the flooding issues in that area. The Infrastructure Committee has been working on this project with the City.

Another project that the maintenance staff assisted by the Architectural committee, brought to our attention, was asking that all owners replace their galvanized pipes into the unit each time a new standpipe and valve are replaced. Prior to recent Board action this was not required. Galvanized metal results in electrolysis caused by the interaction of dissimilar metals. That results in corrosion and the pipes eventually fill with rust deposits. We have been finding some pipes with only pinhole water delivery. Staff has been replacing many standpipes and saddles (the tap into the water line) and we plan to do a methodical replacement program starting with all new builds, but also focusing on the west side of the park which is older. There will be a lot of digging back in the easements to get this done. That will segue us right into the next favorite topic... Clear the easements. But I will leave that for a presentation in March.

The following is a summary of our January $21^{\text {st }}$ and $31^{\text {st }}$ Board meetings.
A report from the Phone and Internet Task Force was given by Bruce Johnston. The Task Force recommendation, for Phase 1 is 'to provide administrative VoIP (voice over internet) phone and internet services". This service would be provided in all common areas. It appears to be a very good idea that would provide better service, upgrade our phone system and save money. Nothing would be provided to individual units in this phase. Phase 2 would look at how to provide internet to Residents. We will have had another report yesterday at our $2 / 7 / 19$ meeting. I will report on that in the future, but to get the information sooner you could watch Channel 17.

A Transmittals report was given by Ken Winters and they were routed appropriately for further study or for a cost estimate to allow for discussion in Budget meetings. I would remind everyone that just because you submitted a transmittal, there is no guarantee that it will be done.

We did pass a motion to keep the back gate open until 10pm, this was after reconsidering information from Residents and Security staff. New signs will be posted re the hours change.

Also passed were motions to raise the rates in both the RV pull through area and in the RV storage area. These rates had not been increased since 2016. I did remind everyone that there is no guarantee that the RV storage area will be there forever. As the last bit of open space in VO, it will definitely be considered as the location for a future Hobby Center.

A motion was passed to change out more street lights and to improve more streets and the valley gutters that run down the middle of the streets and channel the water when it rains. We are getting cost estimates on both of these and the work will only be done if it is included in next years budget.

Speaking of next years budget - and remember that our budget runs from July $1^{\text {st }}$ through June $30^{\text {th }}$ - we will be meeting the week of February 25 th to develop the budget. We meet every morning that week in the Oasis starting at 9am. You are welcome to attend!

Our work sessions covered future staffing needs and wages. As Arizona increases their minimum wage in 2020 and as many fast food restaurants starting wage is $\$ 15$ per hour, it is harder and harder to attract entry level and seasonal workers. We may be looking at an increase to the budget of up to $\$ 200,000$ in payroll and benefits over this next year. We will be talking about this in our budget meetings.

We also talked about whether a "face lift" for the Administration Building could modernize its appearance and functionality enough to keep it going for a \# of years into the future. Versus a complete rebuild. The architects will be including that concept in their evaluation of us.

Last but not least we are exploring credit card use for assessment and other payments, galvanized pipes and fire pits. We are nothing if not versatile!

As I have said before, plan to attend our Annual meeting and election on February $13^{\text {th }}$ in the Ballroom at 1 pm . You will hear updates from many committees, be able to ask questions and also from the Directors that will be leaving the Board at the end of this meeting. The new board will then meet the next day to elect officers and the day after for orientation.

I cannot believe how fast the year has gone! See you at the meeting. Alice Anderson, Condo Board President

## Venture Out Memorial Trust Fund

The Venture Out Memorial Trust Fund, suggested by former owner Chet Rice and created by the Social Board, decided to offer the opportunity for families and friends of deceased residents to contribute money to a fund used for the benefit of all the residents in the park. Instead of placing small individual plaques throughout the park, a number of large plaques with the names of those memorialized would be hung in the Community Center.

This trust, established in 1995, is separate from all other funds and is administered by a committee appointed by the Social Board. The committee has its own financial account.

Since its inception, the Memorial Trust Fund has helped to purchase the following items: microphone and sound equipment, equipment used by Channel 17, a large contribution toward the building of the elevator in the previous Community Center, the purchase of computer and equipment for the AV group, the cost of applying for the Tax Exempt Foundation, money toward expenses for the construction of the Barbecue Pit area, and in 2015, $\$ 3700$ for 10 benches throughout Venture Out.

The committee follows definite guidelines. Any contributions received are considered CASH GIFTS; therefore, any DESIGNATED GIFTS cannot be accepted. All checks are to be made out to Venture Out Social Club.

The cost of the bronze nameplate, the engraving, the stationery and postage used for communicating with relatives of the deceased totals nearly $\$ 25$ per person.
