Manager's Corner



March 22, 2019

This week's occupancy is 1578 or 90% occupied vs 1593 when last reported and 1619 for the year prior. There are currently 392 renters in the park.

The front desk has been very busy checking in Spring Break visitors who are paying the \$2.00 per day fee. That fee helps cover the over \$10,000 spike we see every year in our

water and sewer bill. Please make sure all your overnight guests are always registered and wear their badges. Also, if you are an owner or a renter, you must always wear your badge when using the facilities and take it with you to the pools too. Security does not know all the residents in the park. We have approximately 100 units turn every year and over 400 renters in the park, that is a lot of new faces each year. The badge system is not meant to be onerous, it is meant to ensure that only Venture Out residents and their guests are using the facilities that you have paid for.

I want to answer one question that was asked at last week's Town Hall meeting. The question was why we did not do our own painting? Since the items largely on the budget for painting this year, were the resurfacing of the Tennis Courts and Pickle Ball courts, I can only say, that 'painting' is perhaps not the best terminology for that work. The court contractors are professionals and they squeegee a special paint on, precisely in a uniform thickness and making certain the paint used is always mixed properly since it has a sand aggregate in it. This provides the best possible playing surface and meets tournament standards. Decades ago when they had old asphalt courts, I understand that the clubs used to paint the courts themselves, but that practice went by the wayside in the 90's.

Our maintenance and recreation staff does do a lot of painting all summer long, inside and outside of the buildings; it is one of their principal jobs. Last year for instance, the entire interior of the Admin building was painted for the first time in over 15 years, all done by staff. It involved moving a lot of heavy files and furniture too which is why we don't paint often. All Bathhouses are painted or touched up annually. The Community Center and the EPC are always surveyed for necessary work and touch up paint. This is part of the routine and in the general operations budget.

We are testing out a new Verizon internet option this summer with users in the park. I was at a home on the far west side of the park and we were able to stream three movies simultaneously without any problem. Testing this option this summer, will tell us if it is a viable alternative to DISH and Century Link. DISH promises to bring in more bandwidth this summer, but since they missed the entire season this year, we are not holding our breath. What I did like about the Verizon option is that US owners could take the modem home and use it there, still getting the VO corporate rate. Also in the very near future Verizon will be rolling out their 5G service, which is supposed to provide much faster service and for all of you 'gamers' out there, providing the best possible speed. We do not expect DISH or Century Link to ever provide that kind of speed.

As you leave for the summer, please make sure you have prepared your lots for weeds. We have the list of homeowners and staff here in the ADMIN who are willing to be caretakers for the summer and watch your unit to resolve any issues. Keith Kettle, Architectural Supervisor has also asked that you look for those 'free' palm trees that spring up every year and pull any of those that are cropping up in the easement. Only the original palm trees planted back when the park was developed are allowed in the easement. With all this rain, he is seeing lots of Palms coming up everywhere when he is visiting with homeowners.

Please check out with us at the front desk and make sure we have your most up to date e-mail address so that we can get you the summer newsletter via e-mail. We changed over from paper to e-mail years ago and ever since we have saved thousands of dollars in both print and postage. We currently have e-mail addresses for 89% of the lot owners.

If you are leaving travel safely and hopefully you are not headed back through the flooded Midwest. My relatives are telling me that simple 15 minute drives now take hours as bridges are out everywhere.

# **2020 Concert Series**

The Concert Series Ad Hoc Committee appreciates all the input received from residents and has explored many, varied alternatives to purchasing Concert Series tickets for 2020. A procedure was sought that would assist and be most fair to all residents. The Committee believes that in the not-to-distant future tickets will be purchased on-line but at present this capability is not available for a variety of reasons.

### The following procedures have been adopted for the purchase of Concert Series tickets for the 2019–2020 season:

There will no longer be gold and silver seat offerings. All seats and ticket prices will be equal and the same.

The chart of seat options and the application for seat requests will be made available on the VO website on (July 2, 2019). A fastmail will be sent out by the Recreation Department a week prior as a reminder. If you do not have computer access you may wish to find a source.

The application is to be downloaded, completed and <u>mailed</u> back with a check or credit card information to the Venture Out Activity Office with your desired seats. **Email and phone requests will not be honored**.

Staff will begin processing applications four weeks after the initial offering. This allows for Canadian mailings to be received.

Seats will be assigned by a random lottery draw based on postmarks as to when the application was <u>mailed</u>. Keep in mind there will be several requests bearing the same postmark.

You will be asked to select first and second preference of seats. If your selections are <u>not</u> available, staff will choose the next best available. If you prefer staff NOT select seats you will mark a designated box and your check will be returned/ your credit card will not be charged. You will not receive tickets for the Concert Series.

<u>No</u> phone calls will be made by staff and no special requests honored with the exception of handicap seating which is located at the back wall of the Buena Vista Ballroom.

Only 2 tickets will be allowed per application with only 1 application enclosed per envelope. If this is not honored your request will be disqualified. A confirmation of your seats will be emailed or snail-mailed where applicable in early September.

# **Suggested Closure Checklist**

Here are a few suggestions on how to get your unit ready for the long hot summer months ahead. Remember, careful planning and preparation now can help you avoid costly repairs when you return next season.

1. Check out at Administration Office:

Check for keys, and list of whom can borrow keys.

If you are having renters, ensure your Third-Party forms have been turned in AND paid for.

Update your directory information: email, phone number, summer address.

2. Check out at Post Office – Fill out forwarding address forms if necessary.

3. Avoid water damage – inspect your outside main water supply fitting for signs of leaks and/ or corrosion then turn off the valve – don't block or close your drains. This will allow water to run straight through the drains. If possible, padlock the shut off.

4. To keep your p-traps from drying out – pour in approximately one cup of mineral oil.

5. Turn off your hot water heater and run it until it is cool.

6. Clean your gutters so the rain water has a place to go and does not back up under the shingles and run into your unit.

7. If you DO NOT have low-e window, then put in silver shades to repel the summer heat.

If you have low-e <u>Do NOT</u> cover the windows with anything but pull the shades and curtains. Covering the window will cause damage to your window and glass.

8. Remove all fruit from your trees to avoid roof rats.

9. Check drainage around your unit to make sure the water drains away from the unit in case of a large monsoon rain. Maintenance has sand bags available for you to place around your ground level Arizona Rooms. <u>Do Not</u> leave anything of value or furniture on ground level. Put all furniture up on blocks or inside your unit. Make sure the weep holes in the block wall are free of plants and debris so water can drain.

10. Weed Control – use Ortho Ground Clear (without 2-4-d) to put on your yard to help maintain weed control in the summer. Also, you may want someone who stays in the park for the summer to check on your yard to see if it's effective after summer rains. Green Committee recommends any pre-emergent weed killer that does not have 2-4-d. They recommend you read the label especially the fine print. There is a list of homeowners and staff willing to be caretakers over the summer available in the Administration Office.

11. Golf Carts – Disconnect the batteries. If possible, see if you can find someone to either store the cart for you or charge it once a month, fill it with water and run the cart a little monthly.

# **Suggested Closure Checklist**

12. Do not store wood directly on the ground, under or around your unit as it will attract termites.

13. Replace batteries in the smoke detectors.

14. Check refrigerator – it should be defrosted, be cleaned (including bottom tray) and both refrigerator and freezer doors held open with folded bath towels. An alternate – put one cup uncooked ground coffee beans in refrigerator and close doors.

15. Check stove and oven – clean if needed.

16. Dispose of all food items, except spices. Place small amount of bay leaves in food cupboards.

17. Check all storage areas for perishables.

18. Store all cooking utensils and small appliances in cupboards as space permits.

19. Run garbage disposal until thoroughly clean. Pour  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup of mineral oil, flick on and off and add another  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup of mineral oil. Available at Wal-Mart and most drug stores. Or spray with WD-40.

20. Turn off water to the toilet. Flush toilet several times to clean drain of any solids. Sponge out most of the water in stool and pour in enough mineral oil to cover water. Leave water in the tank.

21. Make sure all bedding, towels and laundry are dry, clean, folded and stored in cupboards.

22. Disconnect small electrical appliances – TV, toaster, coffee maker, etc. Remove batteries from clocks, flashlights, remote controls, etc.

23. Lower any window awning on trailer, if applicable.

24. Turn off electricity at meter. You may lock electric pedestal door.

25. Check skirting openings to be sure they are in place and secure.

26. Pour a quart of RV antifreeze in dishwasher and clothes washer. Pour  $\frac{1}{2}$  cup in drain stand pipe behind clothes washer.

27. Close all propane gas cylinder valves tightly.

28. Cover TV, VCR, Computer, etc. with sheets or towels to prevent dust from infiltrating the working parts.

In 2001, Sue Judson watched a news clip about a young boy trapped beneath a car. A policeman crawled under with a quilt that covered both of them until firefighters could free the boy.

"Where did that policeman get a quilt?" Sue wondered. She called the TV station and they got back to her with information on AZB4K, *Arizona Blankets for Kids.* Sue brought the idea back to the VO Sewing Club where it became part of their outreach program.

AZB4K is a totally volunteer organization. Even the president is a volunteer. Groups from the area bring their blankets to her and she distributes them to hospitals, firemen, police, as well as women and children's shelters, all in the Phoenix metro area.

Sometimes AZB4K provides small grants to quilters' groups and the VO quilters use theirs to buy batting and material that is 100% cotton. Members use fabrics from their donation drawer when they can, but they also buy and donate the material themselves. They enjoy making comfort quilts with age appropriate (infant, toddler, child or teen) designs and colors.

So far this year the Sewing Room has made 89 quilts and the total since 2001 is 3119. Sue has has retired after 18 years of delivering these quilts and Linda Richter has stepped in to continue these gifts of love to vulnerable youth in the Valley of the Sun. ### **Desert Bunnies**

Walking the area under the power lines north of University and east of Higley Streets can transform a stroll through cacti into a bunny watching activity. Recently, fifty-two were counted in an early morning walk. What do they eat in this barren environment? Where do they drink? How do they survive the cactus spines? With the drought leaving virtually no grass, bunnies can be observed sitting up on their back haunches nibbling at cacti or other desert shrubs. In the absence of standing or running water, they acquire moisture from cacti or morning dew.



Bunnies can be spotted racing across pathways or pausing briefly near clumps of cacti before disappearing into small holes which lead to their warrens among the root systems. How the rabbits escape the spines remains a mystery considering how jumping chollas seem to attack without discrimination.

Lucky walkers may be treated to a special performance where two bunnies face one another about six feet apart, then suddenly, one races at the other, while the facing bunny leaps straight up in the air allowing its partner to pass underneath. This routine may repeat itself several times. A Google search reveals that this behaviour is called a "binky", indicating that the bunnies are either happy or engaging in a courting ritual.

The bunnies are mostly small desert cottontails, with the occasional larger, lanky antelope jackrabbit. The cute cottontails provide a food source for many predators including coyotes, bobcats, snakes, and owls. With few defences other than good eyesight, hearing, and the ability to move quickly, they compensate for heavy losses by reproducing at a prodigious rate. Females can breed at three months of age and have multiple litters in a year. The young venture out of their nests after only two weeks.

For those who miss the little bunnies who nightly pruned our flowering vegetation in Venture Out, you may find a delightful alternative under the power lines north of University Street.

### Achievements in Venture Out 2000 to 2020

Residents who have resided in Venture Out for 20 plus years bear witness to many changes which have taken place, each enriching our environment and opportunities. This perspective offers a brief look at those achievements and what they have meant to our community.

In 2000, the Condo Board, under the presidency of Earl Herring, responded to concerns that the Venture Out community had aged and was no longer competitive especially compared with the newer 55 plus communities. With this in mind, Earl Herring struck an ad hoc Marketing Committee to examine the problem and make recommendations. With Rose Anderson in the chair and Edith Kohler as secretary (the only two remaining committee members in the park), the committee had six weeks to present their conclusions. They made several recommendations for marketing the community immediately, as well as for addressing the aged infrastructure and buildings. The Condo Board took these as major recommendations that required resolution.

Mary Schmit arrived in the park as General Manager in 2001, shortly after the Marketing Committee concluded activities. At the time, 110 park models were for sale and that number peaked at 165 prior to the new Community Center being built. Rentals rose to as many as 145. Mary completely agreed with the conclusions of the committee. Under the direction of President John Ingebrand, Dr. Wendy Hultsman from ASU, was hired to produce a formal long-range plan. She met with 400 residents in separate focus groups and mailed a survey to every Venture Out homeowner. Those results, along with her report, formed the basis for changes we have witnessed over time.

By 2004, lot owners had voted to build a new Community Center and the old one came under demolition. Four years prior, owners voted to add raised Arizona rooms to their park models. Becoming clear that Venture Out was moving forward with the new Community Center, a building boom began in the park, with raised Arizona rooms springing up everywhere. These two changes alone resulted in a major shift in the sales and rentals in the park and that interest continues to this day.

In 2001, Pickle Ball began with 4 courts west of the Administration Building. Today, we enjoy a fine facility with 11 courts

in the Sports Complex complete with kitchen, patio, and restrooms; a direct result of changing interests. The addition of Bocce Ball began with 2 courts; now we have 5 and a clubhouse as well.

A remarkable achievement, the East Pool Complex, built in 2014, adds a larger pool, a state-of-the-art fitness center, a large multi-purpose room as well as spacious and well-equipped restrooms complete with saunas. The addition of solar panels on covered parking contributes to significant savings on SRP charges. In fact, the East Pool solar panels reduce the SRP charges of that complex some months to less than \$500. As well, SRP replaced all primaries and 10 miles of conduit, an estimated value of \$20 million.



2010 saw the renovation of the pull-throughs providing first-class accommodation for recreational vehicles. Always completely booked, they not only provide a major source of revenue for the park, but also serve as an introduction for potential buyers. That same year, the front gate and "Golden Corridor" received an upgrade and decals for vehicles were introduced.

While buildings and landscaping constitute a noticeable change, a number of other significant changes occurred as well. The removal of razor wire from the top of the wall and the planting of cacti around the outside perimeter improves the appearance. Collection of garbage and recycling by VO employees removed the need for heavy truck traffic on streets. In fact, the recycling program continues to grow with an eager response from residents. In addition, we enjoy a multitude of cable channels, as well as channel 17, dedicated to VO interests. Street surfaces and new lighting continue to be replaced.

At present, the median age has dropped from 75 to 70, an important fact for considerations when planning future development. If our property is to be maintained, long-range planning and development will never be complete, but remains an on-going challenge. This is what makes Venture Out the most sought after resort in the valley.

### West Pool Study

The West Pool Ad-Hoc Committee was recently established by the Condo Board to study and make recommendations for improvements and changes necessary for the future. The West Pool is close to 50 years old and the cost for repairs and upkeep has grown significantly over the years, necessitating a remodel, upgrade or entirely new pool. The study was requested as a result of the Long Range Plan adopted by the Condo Board. The committee, chaired by Beryl

Willerton, is composed of representatives from the various governing boards and committees.

The study will attempt to gather information from the users of the West Pool about their preferences and interests. To accomplish this goal, several focus-group interviews will be scheduled. Participants will be asked to attend an information gathering session that is expected to last approximately one hour. Each session will consist of a group discussion with 10-15 users of the West Pool. The sessions will be led by a facilitator who will ask a series of 6-8 questions designed to gather data.

A Fast Mail notification will be sent to all property owners and renters once the dates and rooms for these sessions have been determined. Several alternative sessions will be arranged in order to enable as many people as possible to attend. You will then be asked to call or stop in at the Activity Office to sign up. A large-group input session in March will also be



available in the Center Ballroom for a presentation of the proposed recommendations to the Condo Board.
