Suggested Closure Checklist to 'Summer-ize' your Home

Here are a few suggestions on how to get your unit ready for the long hot summer months ahead. Remember, careful planning and preparation now can help you avoid costly repairs when you return next season.

♦ Check out at Administration Office:

Check for keys, and list of whom can borrow keys.

If you are having renters, ensure your Third-Party forms have been turned in AND paid for.

Update your directory information: email, phone number, summer address.

- ♦ 2. Check out at Post Office Fill out forwarding address forms if necessary.
- ♦ 3. Avoid water damage inspect your outside main water supply fitting for signs of leaks and/or corrosion then turn off the valve don't block or close your drains. This will allow water to run straight through the drains. If possible, padlock the shut off.
- ♦ 4. To keep your p-traps from drying out pour in approximately one cup of mineral oil.
- ♦ 5. Turn off your hot water heater and run it until it is cool.
- 6. Clean your gutters so the rainwater has a place to go and does not back up under the shingles and run into your unit.
- ♦ 7. If you DO NOT have low-e window, then put in silver shades to repel the summer heat.
- If you have low-e <u>Do NOT</u> cover the windows with anything but pull the shades and curtains. Covering the window will cause damage to your window and glass.
- ♦ 8. Remove all fruit from your trees to avoid roof rats.
- 9. Check drainage around your unit to make sure the water drains away from the unit in case of a large monsoon rain. Maintenance has sandbags available for you to place around your ground level Arizona Rooms. Do Not leave anything of value or furniture on ground level. Put all furniture up on blocks or inside your unit. Make sure the weep holes in the block wall are free of plants and debris so water can drain.
- ♦ 10. Weed Control maintain weed control in the summer. Also, you may want someone who stays in the park for the summer to check on your yard to see if it's effective after summer rains. Green Committee recommends any pre-emergent weed killer that does not have 2-4-d. They recommend you read the label especially the fine print.
- ♦ 11. Golf Carts Disconnect the batteries. If possible, see if you can find someone to either store the cart for you or charge it once a month, fill it with water and run the cart a little monthly.
- ♦ 12. Do not store wood directly on the ground, under or around your unit as it will attract termites.
- ♦ 13. Replace batteries in the smoke detectors.

- 14. Check refrigerator it should be defrosted, be cleaned (including bottom tray) and both refrigerator and freezer doors held open with folded bath towels. An alternate put one cup uncooked ground coffee beans in refrigerator and close doors.
- ♦ 15. Check stove and oven clean if needed.
- 16. Dispose of all food items, except spices. Place small amount of bay leaves in food cupboards.
- ♦ 17. Check all storage areas for perishables.
- \$\delta\$ 18. Store all cooking utensils and small appliances in cupboards as space permits.
- 19. Run garbage disposal until thoroughly clean. Pour ½ cup of mineral oil, flick on and off and add another ½ cup of mineral oil. Available at Wal-Mart and most drug stores. Or spray with WD-40.
- ♦ 20. Turn off water to the toilet. Flush toilet several times to clean drain of any solids. Sponge out most of the water in stool and pour in enough mineral oil to cover water. Leave water in the tank.
- ♦ 21. Make sure all bedding, towels and laundry are dry, clean, folded and stored in cupboards.
- ♦ 22. Disconnect small electrical appliances TV, toaster, coffee maker, etc. Remove batteries from clocks, flashlights, remote controls, etc.
- ♦ 23. Lower any window awning on trailer, if applicable.
- ♦ 24. Turn off electricity at meter. You may lock electric pedestal door.
- ♦ 25. Check skirting openings to be sure they are in place and secure.
- ♦ 26. Pour a quart of RV antifreeze in dishwasher and clothes washer. Pour ½ cup in drain standpipe behind clothes washer.
- ♦ 27. Close all propane gas cylinder valves tightly.
- ♦ 28. Cover TV, VCR, Computer, etc. with sheets or towels to prevent dust from infiltrating the working parts.
- ♦ 29. Lock up and/or store bicycles inside enclosed Arizona Room/ Residence/ or Storage.





From their home in Lafleche, Saskatchewan, Jodi and Bob Faith made annual trips to Phoenix where Bob fell in love with both the city and the ease of traveling around the area where he competed in high level senior baseball tournaments. They discovered Venture Out in 2005 and bought a new raised Arizona room model.

Jodi had been an award-winning vocalist as a child, but at the age of 18, she married a man who literally forbade her from singing. That marriage ended with significant domestic violence, but Jodi found solace and healing in the music played in her church. She also began intensive counseling where she was encouraged to "do something for Jodi each day!" With no self-confidence, she began to sing in the church choir where the artist and music community became important to her healing journey. Bob Faith was in that congregation and encouraged her to audition for solos with the choir. A year later he proposed, on condition she would sing at the wedding!

Since arriving at Venture Out, Jodi has been a part of the VO Worship Choir, the Glee Group, Bocce, and the Hams at Heart, a VO community theater group. She credits those many fun opportunities with helping her to grow in self-confidence. A traveling performing artist since 2005, she received many awards including through the Canadian Division of the Country Gospel Music Association of Branson, Missouri where she performed. Those awards opened doors internationally for her music, media, speaking and teaching career as a songwriter, author, and performance coach. Last summer she began an intergenerational music program for 3 – 103 years olds in Medicine Hat, Alberta, where Jodi and Bob live during the summer months. Jodi has produced 7 albums, a made-for-TV Christmas DVD and her autobiography has been published with talk of a movie.

Bob coaches the VO Sidewinders Softball team and still works as a substitute teacher at home while Jodi is happy to take on a new membership as a writer on the VO VOICES Committee.

A Lot to Swallow



Mark Phillips moved from Chicago to Arizona in 2010. On a visit to Venture Out in 2023, he realized that he missed being a part of a community. Noting the many activities at VO, he sold his home in Scottsdale and bought in Venture Out.

Recently, Mark hosted four free and popular events where he presented humorous, non-snobby and easy to understand ways to view wine. But wine was not his first business venture. At the age of 10, he had the bright idea to take broken televisions of local neighbors to a TV repair shop, then return them repaired, charging a commission on the sets he had "fixed." By the age of 28, he had worked at more than 100 jobs. He was fired from five jobs in a row because he refused to follow the demands of his supervisor.

He loved to interview for jobs, and often landed positions outside his scope of training or experience, but then he and a friend started a limousine service. Despite this business going broke, Mark's hard work and determination paid off. The company went on to become the number one limo service in the greater Dallas area. Their reputation of quality, discreetness, and VIP service led to many experiences with famous and wealthy clientele, including the Saudi royal family and their servants.

Mark sold his limo business when he was 32 and at his retirement dinner, he experienced his first taste of wine. Mark had been an avid beer drinker, but that evening realized that he enjoyed wine more than beer. He also discovered that wine connoisseurs had too many rules that most people didn't resonate with, and he wanted wine to be a fun and enjoyable experience for everyone. So, for his next venture, he started a consumer wine group which grew to become the largest in the nation. During this time, he also filmed a show on a local cable station in which he discussed wine along.

After immersing himself in the business of wine for a year, he gave talks to groups. During one of these presentations, the Vice President of PBS who was in the audience signed him to do a show for the network. This show aired for six years and is, to this day, the most watched wine show of all time. During his stint there, he wrote a book that hit number 1 on Amazon entitled "Swallow This".

Mark told people that he retired at the age of 32, but Mark continues to create new business ideas, and over the years has been a wine sommelier, television star, author, educator, and inventor. He has traveled and taught about wine and pickleball internationally and has developed products that have gained him international recognition.

Military Story



Mel Cannell joined the Royal Canadian Airforce (RCF) at age 17. He was so young his mother had to sign for him. After basic training in St. Jeans Québec, he was stationed in Clinton, Ontario for trade training to become a fighter controller. His eventual career spanned 37 years before retirement in Saskatoon, Saskatoon.

Mel met his wife, Mary, who was also in the RCA, while stationed in St. Hubert, Quebec. During this lengthy career, spanning nearly four decades and two continents, Mel and Mary were in numerous cities in North American and Germany. Mary reported that they eventually lived in 18 different houses. Mary was reared in a German speaking home and did not learn English until she started in school. German fluency was a definite asset during the two tours in Germany. With four children, they tried to plan their transfers during the summer so they could enroll their children in yet another school. Three of their assignments were in the US including Langley Airforce base in Virginia, Larson AFB in Moses Lake Washington, and California. Two of Mel and Mary's four children are American citizens after having been born while they were stationed in the US. One of Mel's assignments was as Commanding Officer of the Canadian Airforce Station in Fulcan Bridge, Ontario.

Significant events occurred during Mel's tenure with the RCF including the Cuban missile crises when they and the tearing down of the Berlin Wall. Mel and his crew also observed an unidentified flying object (UFO) at a radar site on the tip of Vancouver Island. It consisted of a large reddish orange orb hovering approximately 11 miles away. The incident was reported through the chain of command and two fighter jets were dispatched but the object darted away faster than the jets could move.

Mel and Mary feel at home in Venture Out. It reminds them of a military base with people living in close proximity, a gated facility with walls and security entrances, common activities, and a shared community of like-minded people.
